### JAPS BLOCKADE ANGLO-FRENCH CONCESSIONS

### British Government May Revise Policy In Tientsin Crisis

LONDON, June 14.—The Government will be forced to reassess its whole Far Eastern policy if Japan persists in blockading the British concession at Tientsin, informed sources said tonight.  
The Cabinet reviewed the situation shortly before Foreign Secretary Richard Butler told the House of Commons that the Government was considering possible measures of retaliation against the Japanese blockade. It is understood the cabinet reached no decision regarding economic counter-measures although the question is being considered by several government departments, including the Board of Trade.  
It was stated on high authority that Britain will not submit tamely to the Japanese blockade which the Government is convinced, is concerned not so much with the British protection of four alleged Chinese terrorists as with a Japanese attempt to gain a financial stranglehold on North China.  
Britain is anxious to avoid economic retaliation for no other reason than that it would injure British trade in China as well as that of Japan. However, it is believed here that Japan, after two years of costly war with China, would feel the pinch quickly, particularly if France cooperated with Great Britain.

### King Recalls Former Visit To Province

Prince Edward Island resembled England, King George told Lieutenant-Governor George D. DeBlois at luncheon yesterday. The King made this remark, the Governor said, after he had looked intently for some time at the red cliffs and green meadows across Charlottetown Harbor.  
After the toasts to Their Majesties had been proposed and King George had settled back in his chair with a cigarette, he recalled the days when he was here in 1913 as a midshipman aboard the H.M.S. Cumberland, Lieutenant-Governor DeBlois said. They were pleasant memories the monarch told Prince Edward Island's Governor.  
Their Majesties signed the Lieutenant-Governor's "Golden Book of Remembrance," in the Government House study later in the afternoon. The portfolio, bound in red leather, was made especially for the signatures of the royal couple.  
Lieut.-Governor and Mrs. DeBlois were presented with two photographs of Their Majesties, framed in silver, by the monarchs.

### COLORFUL RECEPTION AT GOVT. HOUSE

Charlottetown's historic Government House, the white pillared colonnade of the King's representative in Prince Edward Island for most of the years since 1834, yesterday reached its happiest and most brilliant moment when it housed for a brief visit the Empire's reigning King and Queen.  
Flower-decked inside and out, Government House, in the form of the Hon. George D. DeBlois, has attained its ultimate in beauty.  
For this particular event a welcome spruce archway erected at the entrance gates, the driveway being bordered by standards with colorful pennants bearing the Island and other coats of arms. The interior of the house appears over the portico with garlands, inside, red, gold and blue satin draperies and profusion of beam and gladioli give a festive air to the dignified interior.  
Yellow roses and lilies of the valley in low cut vases adorned the official luncheon table on which sparkled gold service plates, Crown Derby china and gold rimmed crystal. At this luncheon a band of twelve Canadian musicians entertained the guests with a brilliant programme of piano numbers from the works of Chopin, Beethoven, Liszt, Strauss, and his own compositions and arrangements. Interposed on the new electric piano brought from Montreal especially for the occasion by Lieutenant-Governor DeBlois, this programme was one of intense interest to those assembled.  
During the backward season, the formal luncheon at Government House was a curious sight, with the mouth clipped green of the vast expanse of lawn broken at intervals by shell-bordered paths on the veranda. Many of the guests were garbed in gowns and capers, golden garlands, brilliant hued perennials and countless other flowers.  
Here hundreds of guests awaited the climactic moment when the Lieutenant-Governor, Their Majesties would appear and most and talk with many of their people.  
Unfortunately the rain prevented the presentations from taking place in the Gardens but those so honored were presented by the Premier to the King and Queen at the foot of the beautiful stairway.  
Immediately after Their Majesties braved the rain and to the heartfelt cheers of the guests walked around the gravel driveway, stopping occasionally to speak to the Girl Guides who were stationed at the edge of the drawing room repeatedly looking out of the window so those another simple—needless to say, eagerly awaited. The rain may have drenched the Gardens but it did not dampen the general enthusiasm.

### Unprecedented Scenes Of Enthusiasm Witnessed In Charlottetown Yesterday

### Rainstorm Failed To Dampen Ardour Of Cheering Populace Which Turned Out In Thousands To Greet King George And Queen Elizabeth.

This royally named Province of Prince Edward Island—birthplace of Confederation and scene of many historic events and royal visitations—rose enthusiastically yesterday to the great occasion of welcoming Their Majesties King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, first reigning Sovereigns to set foot on Canadian soil.  
Despite a rainstorm which continued intermittently all day, the oldest residents recall nothing remotely approaching the tremendous demonstration witnessed in the Island capital during the four hours' visit of Their Majesties. It was the culmination of weeks of anxious planning and preparation on the part of officials, merchants, and citizens generally to make this the greatest day in the Province's history.  
Along streets crowded on both sides with cheering people and decorated with flags and bunting the motor cars bearing the Royal party and federal, provincial and civic dignitaries proceeded by the scheduled route to the Provincial Building and Government House, returning by way of Victoria Park driveway and Brighton Road through residential and business sections to the Marine Wharf.

### Short Scenes From The Royal Visit

Six nursing sisters and two V. A. D.'s who saw service overseas during the Great War years of 1914-18 stood before the Monument erected in memory of Prince Edward Island's war dead and cheered the King and Queen, They wore service uniforms.

One small body of men who commanded attention on the procession route were the Boer War veterans who lined up before the South Africa War Memorial near the Provincial Building. They also attended the reception at Government House as guests.

They marched again Veterans of the Great War—over 700 of them—somewhat older, somewhat grayer, but straight-shouldered and erect lined the urban district of the city yesterday and gave a vociferous welcome to the King and Queen. Their appearance had a kaleidoscopic effect. Berries of every color and hue were worn by the veterans according to the units with which they served overseas. On the return route they lined the Government House driveway to bid adieu to Their Majesties. The parade was marshalled by Sergt-Major G. E. Trainor.

Scouts, Cubs, Girl Guides and Brownies from all over the Province congregated on a section of Great George Street attracted the attention of royalty. Dressed in uniform they made a colorful spectacle and drew smiles and hand waves from the Sovereigns as they drove by.

Mrs. Arsenae Lord 94-year-old resident of Souris and a daughter of one of the Fathers of Confederation, was among those presented to Their Majesties. Mrs. Lord was present at the meeting here in 1871 at which her father Col. John Hamilton Gray was chairman. She also attended the Quebec meeting which resulted in the formation of the Dominion of Canada.

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Crowds everywhere, cheering vociferously, occupying every available point of vantage at street curbs, doorways, windows and stands. Some even succeeded on getting on roof-tops.

#### The School Children

It was a wonderful day for everyone, but especially for the children, who were massed five rows deep along both sides of lower Great George Street to be the first to hail Their Majesties after leaving the wharf, and who despite the rain entered wholeheartedly into the spirit of the occasion. With eager faces upturned, they cheered and waved their flags, and cheered and cheered again as the King and Queen turned smilingly from one side to the other, graciously acknowledging their salutations and waving back in response from the big open car in which they could plainly see and be seen by all.

#### Enthusiastic Crowds

Charlottetown's population of 13,000 was almost tripled by 22,000 residents from all sections who drove into the city in every vehicle available for the great event. There were even 200 from Sydney, N. S., which Their Majesties do not visit on their tour.

streets of the capital ready to give Their Majesties a boisterous welcome.

Five trains that gathered people from all parts of the Province arrived early yesterday morning, and the hundreds of travellers lost themselves in the crowds estimated at 35,000, nearly triple the city's normal population.  
The streets leading to the city saw hundreds of mud-spattered automobiles filled with families of outlying districts on their way to Charlottetown.  
Splashing over greasy clay roads through rain did not dampen the high spirits of Their Majesties' loyal subjects who were out to give a rousing welcome to King George and Queen Elizabeth.

The crowds began to gather early around the Provincial Legislative Building where, in the room where Canadian Confederation was born the farmer left his fields, the fisherman his nets and the business man slugged the padlock on his door and all gathered on the

### DENY TROOPS MASSING ON SLOVAK BORDER

BERLIN, June 14.—(CP Hava)—The German press today denied reports that German troops are concentrating on the Slovak border and countered with an attack on Great Britain and Poland.  
The official German news agency sarcastically remarked that "Fiesl Street is marching the German Army again," and added that "this flood of British lies is a world shame and grotesquely caricatures that 'fairness of which British Government leaders tried to convince us recently."  
The Danish newspaper Vorposten meanwhile announced that Polish authorities searched the houses of several Germans in Westast last night and arrested four of the occupants. One of those arrested was said to be the head of the local German youth association.  
"A wave of terrorism looms over the German group in Poland," the Vorposten commented. "Thousands of German lives have already been ruined, and the authorities do nothing to put an end to this terrorism."  
Writing in the Labor Front organ, Der Angriff, Dr. Robert Ley, Labor Front Leader, told German workers that recent German annexations "are only the beginning of what we want."  
Referring to Germans as "people without space," Ley said that the problem of "lebensraum" (living space) "has got to be solved one way or another."

### Wide Hunt For Baby Killer

CLYDE, O., June 14.—A killer, who snatched a sleeping baby from his carriage and tossed him into a creek to drown, aroused the northern Ohio town of 2,100 tonight.  
The body of Haldon Fink, 10 weeks old, was found floating today in Green River, seven miles from the Clyde home whence he disappeared 12 hours earlier.  
Sheriff E. L. Myers said he had no clues, but expressed belief a maniac might have been responsible.  
The boy's parents, Irvin Fink and Mrs. Velma Baker Fink, were divorced last week.

### General Election In Fall, Belief

OTTAWA, June 14.—A general election late in October or early in November is one of the popular guesses among Ottawa political observers who generally seem convinced that Prime Minister Mackenzie King will seek a fresh mandate for the Liberal Party this year, unless some international crisis interferes.  
Mr. Mackenzie King will return to Ottawa Saturday after more than a month's absence during which he acted as minister in attendance upon the King. His duties in that regard close tomorrow night when Their Majesties sail from Halifax.  
No announcement is expected on the election issue for some time yet, but meanwhile it is understood several cabinet ministers are acting on the assumption that a fall election will be held.
