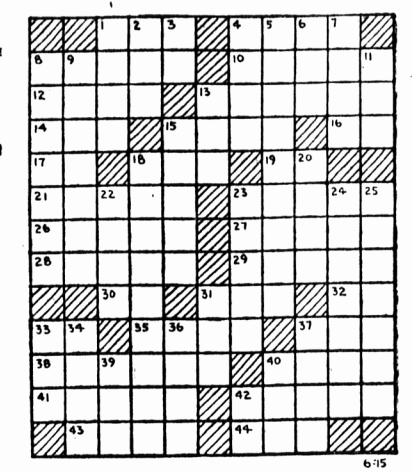

New York Stocks

NEW YORK, (AP)—A nervous stock market slumped last week to a low average since last October but subsequent rallies made up half the loss.

Despite the recovery movement, there appeared to be a growing feeling in Wall Street that the lows would have to be tested before any summer rally could get under way. "Uncertainty" was the key word as Wall Street sources attempted to explain the falling market. The uncertainty involved the Korean truce discussions and the United States government's tax and money policies. Brokers contended that settlement of some of these questions would clear the air and enable the market to put on a good show of strength.

Selling Tuesday sent the Associated Press average of 60 stocks down \$2.40 to \$104.20, a low since Oct. 23, 1952. Volume rose to 2,200,000 shares, but most brokers expressed doubt that this was large enough to represent the "climax" of the downward movement.

Canadian stocks ended the week higher. McIntyre and Distillers-Seagram each gained 1-8 Friday and Hiram Walker was up 1-4. Canadian Pacific picked up half a point. Giant Yellowknife and Royalle oil each gained 1-8.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, (AP)—Buyer caution toward higher-priced steel and price cuts by two producers were cited by Steel magazine Sunday as further evidence of a balance between steel supply and demand.

In its weekly summary of the metalworking industry, the magazine said concerns that have been purchasing conversion high-priced steel now believe they soon may be able to get all the steel they need without paying premium prices.

Pointing out that the auto makers have used considerable premium-priced tonnage to piece out their supplies, the magazine added: "Their cautiousness not only makes them wary of signing commitments for fourth-quarter delivery but it is influencing them to push for the earliest possible delivery of tonnage already ordered for the third quarter."

The premium-priced areas, Steel added, are always among the first ones to reflect approach of a balance between supply and demand.
