DRAMA FESTIVAL STARTS

'Bit Stiff' Is Observation On First Play Presented

"A very good job, even though a bit stiff at times and displaying the necessity for more work on voice and movement." Thus did adjudicator Daniel MacDonald of Halifax last night sum up his review of "Many Moons", a Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild production, and the first staged of the three three-act drama festival finals of 1959.

Written by James Thurber especially for children, the play was directed by Herbert Baxter, and all 10 characters were played by juveniles.

Try to enunciate each line as if it were fresh, original, something that came to your mind at that very moment, Mr. MacDonald advised the young actors and actresses. Do not anticipate, even though that which is going to occur, or be said, is perfectly well known to all.

"BRUSHED OVER"
Much of the humor and homely philosophy interjected into the

story by the dramatist was "brushed over", Mr. MacDonald observed.

Nine-year-old Heather Armstrong was exactly the delightful little princess he had hoped to see, the adjudicator asserted. In addition, he complimented the tiny actress on her excellent memory work and diction.

With minor exceptions, all the other junior players had performed well, Mr. MacDonald added.

The adjudicator, a native of Pictou and assistant dramatics advisor in the adult education division of Nova Scotia's education department, was introduced to the audience by Hilda Ramsay, C.D.A., president of the P.E.I. Drama Festival Association.

The second three-act entry in the current festival, "The Eager Miss Beaver", produced by the Easter Monday Players under the direction of F.M. MacIntyre will be staged at the Community Centre tonight.

About 75 men and women attended the Kensington Lions Club annual banquet and installation of officers at Lakeview Lodge in Cavendish last night, where representatives from Lions Clubs in Souris, Charlottetown, Borden, and Summerside, were in attendance.

Other guests including Ken Hannah, chairman of the Springhill-Lions Club Disaster Relief Fund; Stan Siddall, of Amherst, special representative for Lions International and R.J. Hill, assistant superintendent, Maritime division of the Canadian Institute of the Blind.

The new executive of the Kensington Club were installed by district deputy Russell Kelly of Summerside, assisted by zone chairman Eric Jessome of Kensington.

Succeeding the retiring president Ron Kennedy, the new king lion of the Kensington Club is Boyd Bearsto while other members of the executive are Andrew Johnson, first vice president; Gordon Kennedy, second vice president; Earl Dunning, third vice president; Glydon Willis, secretary; Gene Spicer, treasurer; Willard Stewart, lion tamer;

Prince Co. Welfare Agency Annual Meeting Is Held

SUMMERSIDE — Children are often the helpless victims of broken homes and alcoholism. F. Earle McDonald, chairman of child welfare of the Prince County Welfare Agency, told the annual meeting Monday evening in reporting 40 new boarding home placements made during the year, along with five new adoptions completed, and seven more pending.

He said the agency would appreciate offers of free home care for wards of the agency, and two such offers had been received during the year.

Chairman of the family welfare committee, Gordon Kelly, said that \$1,687 had been spent on social action during the year for food, fuel and clothing. He said that 31 unwell children were helped during the year.

President Henry W. Wedge, who presided at the meeting, reported that representatives of this agency, with representatives of the Catholic and Protestant agencies of Charlottetown, had met the provincial government and requested that the government pay the board of wards of the agencies placed in foster homes. Although this request had not been granted, the annual grant had been increased from \$200 to \$300.

He said he was grateful to the parish priests for their co-operation, and expressed thanks for all the donations that had been received, mentioning that the West End Club, comprising a small group of women, had raised \$450 during the year. He reported that the penny-a-meal campaign in Summerside had produced \$3,500. He paid tribute to the executive director, Sister Mary Eugene, for her outstanding work carried out with the assistance of the other sisters of the bureau.

The financial report by treasurer, T. Earle Hickey, showed receipts for the year were \$18,503.11 while expenditures were \$15,690.25, leaving a surplus of \$2,812.86. However, he said this surplus would have to meet the expenses of the agency through the next four months until the next financial campaign can be held. The installation of the new heating system will involve some expense, he said. Donations received in the form of food and clothing, etc., during the year were valued at \$4,000.

SOCIAL ACTION
The executive director, Sister Mary Eugene, stated that the agency is more than a relief-giving concern.

Referring to the setting up of social action groups in the parish she said she hoped that these groups would serve to restore neighborhood charity.
