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COURT DECIDES

Etcheverry To Play With Al's

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP)—Quarterback Sam Etcheverry Tuesday won the right to continue his football career with Montreal Alouettes as United States District Judge Waldo H. Rogers dismissed an action by an American football club seeking to prevent him from playing for the Canadian team.

In denying an injunction to Chicago Cardinals of the National Football League, the judge held that the American club did not have a valid contract with Etcheverry when he signed with the Alouettes.

Etcheverry had mailed a signed contract to the Cardinals on Jan. 5, 1955 but telephoned officials of the club the same evening asking them to release him from it as he had decided to accept an offer from the Alouettes.

Etcheverry had played the previous year, the Cardinals attempted to sue him for breach of contract but the judge, after he added a warning: "Perhaps in six or eight years your passes may begin to wobble and you may not be able to find your pass receivers. You may then find that your abilities are such that the Alouettes would not send a twice-disbarred lawyer from Dogpatch to defend you."

Etcheverry's counsel, Robert Nordhaus, described the reserve system as "a system of peonage not in effect in this country since about 1865."

Etcheverry, Montreal's quarter-back since 1952, was described as "a unique financier" by the judge. But he added a warning: "Perhaps in six or eight years your passes may begin to wobble and you may not be able to find your pass receivers. Archie Moore And Parker Sign For Heavyweight Bout

Joe Bygraves Wins Empire Heavyweight Championship?

LONDON (Reuters)—Joe Bygraves of Jamaica won the vacant British Empire heavyweight title here Tuesday night gaining a 15-round decision over Kitione Lave, the "Tongan Tiger" from the Friendly Islands.

Bygraves had previously met Lave and gained a similar decision. The Jamaican owed his victory to his storming finish for he was probably still behind on points as late as the 10th round.

LAVE STARTS STRONG Lave started on the offensive and got the better of the earlier rounds with his opponent missing badly. In the third round a short right by the Tongan sent Bygraves to the canvas for a count of eight.

The West Indian caught a hard right in the 10th round, his left eye starting to bleed and close. This stirred him into action and from then on the title was in his pocket.

Bygraves opened a cut below Lave's right eye in the 13th. In the last round the Tongan tried for a knockout but Bygraves hung on to gain the crown.
