S'side Carnival Shows Slight Profit For Year

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN—The Summerside Ladies' Carnival held the second portion of its 1963 wind-up annual meeting that approximately 25 percent of the 1963 net profit of approximately \$1,650. It was estimated however that approximately 25 percent of the year's accounts have not been finalized.

The volume of business for the carnival year ending Sept. 20, 1963, was \$36,100. The carnival's gross revenue came from: winter works grant for fisheries display, \$2,169; mid-way concessions, \$1,200; folders and programs, \$1,650; department of agriculture grant for livestock show, \$1,245; and admissions, \$1,220.

Other net profits included book rentals, \$500; supper, \$580; canteen, \$420; bingo, \$325; department of fisheries grant, \$201; and wild life tickets, \$125.

The carnival lost \$15 on their high sale.

Because of the unanticipated high cost of the year's past parade the meeting passed a motion to turn over a breakdown of the expenses to the new chairman.

S'side Child Has Skull Fracture

SUMMERSIDE — A Summer-side child, Bobby McKendrick, two and one-half year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan McKendrick, Central Street, was flown to Victoria General Hospital, Halifax last night after being struck by an automobile near his home at approximately 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Following the collision he was immediately rushed to the Prince County Hospital. The attending physician was Dr. James L. Saunders, Summerside.

It is believed the child suffered a fractured skull among other injuries and that surgery was performed prior to the flight to Halifax.

A Dakota from Search and Rescue, RCAF Greenwood departed from Summerside with the injured child along with Dr. Saunders at approximately 8:25 last night.

Team Approach Required To Reduce Accident Rate

The high costs of responsibility and the need for a team approach and a sense of accountability in dealing with them, was pointed out by T.H. MacLellan, safety supervisor of the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company, last evening at a banquet of the P.E.I. Young Liberals' Association here.

Mr. MacLellan outlined a five-point plan for running a safety program in industry: organization, fact finding, analysis of causes, selection of remedy, and application of remedy.

"Accident prevention is a combination of humanity and good business," he said. It means "control of man performance, physical performance, and physical environment."

He commented that his company's safety manual was, in effect, "written in blood," saying that "if we don't learn by the experiences of others, we're stupid."

"It has been proven that the experiences of others are worth 30 accidents, there are 30 minor injuries, and one fatal," he said.

He gets a chance to correct the cause and prevent a re-occurrence," he said.

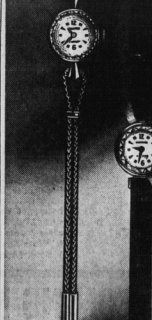
