point of view in the legislature. Agreement was reached in principle yesterday on many problems that may be discussed, he indicated.

"We'll criticize constructively. We won't criticize merely for the sake of criticism," the new leader said.

Mr. Campbell believes that the new electoral act — it wipes out Fifth Kings, adds two members to Fifth Queens and changes certain boundaries in Prince — should be proclaimed now, if it is to be used for the next election. It would be most unfair to proclaim it just before an election, he said.

Changes in Prince County include the removal of the Miscouche, St. Nicholas and Sherbrooke districts — they're Liberal areas, he said — from the Summerside district (Fifth Prince) and tacking them on to Third and Fourth Prince.

The government will be urged to give more incentive and encouragement to Island industries to expand and develop. They're suffering now for lack of financing, and they should be encouraged in every way possible, he said.

Failure to develop industrial parks across the province was also criticized. In Nova Scotia, he contrasted, there is keen and vigorous competition among per-

has a dozen industrial parks. The P.E.I. Industrial Corporation will take a hand, once it gets into action, but the government still has a responsibility, Mr. Campbell contends.

PROGRAM FOR ALCOHOLICS

Mr. Campbell said his group will urge a revitalized program for the treatment of alcoholics be established immediately.

The co-ordination of government administration for the treatment of senior citizens, older people in nursing homes and the disabled, is also suggested.

The Liberal MYAs met Thursday afternoon in the Charlottetown Hotel, adjourned briefly for dinner, then resumed their discussion of policy for the immediate future.

Evidence Is Submitted In Break, Entry Case

Judge C. St. Clair Trainor presided at the trial of Francis William Quinn, 26 Great George Street, Charlottetown, yesterday in County Court Judge's Criminal Court. Quinn was charged with break and entry with intent to commit theft at the Fishermen's Loan Board Office situated at the corner of Richmond and Grafton Streets on or about Nov. 10 or 11. The accused pleaded not guilty to the charge.

A. K. Seales, represented the Crown. C. R. MacQuaid QC, was counsel for the accused.

The Crown called five witnesses. They were: Mrs. Shelia McAleer, employee of the Fishermen's Loan Board, Cpl. W. H. Smith, RCMP; Leonard Baisley, employee of the Loan Board; Sgt. Charles Ready, City Police and Cpl. C. A. J. Bungy, RCMP.

DISCOVERED

Mrs. McAleer testified that she had locked the office on the night of Nov. 10th at approximately 5 o'clock and that it was in its normal state. She said she went back to the office about 10:30 the next morning and that it was in quite a state of disarray. Desk drawers were pulled out and there were pap-

used had nothing to say about the break.

Cpl. Bungy said that he had identified himself to the accused and given him the usual police warning at the jail before asking him any questions. He told the accused that his prints had been found in the building. The accused replied that he had been in the building lots of times with Tommy Larter. When the accused was asked when he was last there he didn't wish to answer nor did he have anything to say about the break. While at the jail, Cpl. Bungy examined the hands of the accused and found a cut on the palm of his left hand, which, he said, could have been there for a few days.

There was no evidence for the defence.

In summation Mr. Seales said that the only evidence against the accused were the fingerprints found on the piece of wood, allegedly from a window casing, in the Loan Board building. He said that the circumstances were consistent with the guilt of the accused.

Mr. MacQuaid said that the only evidence was circumstantial and that the only circumstance was a fingerprint on a piece of wood. He said this was no grounds to convict the accused.

Quinn was remanded until Jan. 5th for judgment.
