

WON'T BE FEDERAL CANDIDATE AGAIN, STATES T. J. KICKHAM

"I will not offer again as a federal candidate," Thomas J. Kickham told this paper yesterday.

The Souris West man, who started in provincial politics in the 1949 election and served two terms in the House of Commons, said he is going to stick to the nomination convention in Georgetown last year, when he said the election this year would be his last effort, whether he is or not.

Mr. Kickham said he had never been so sure of winning, and is naturally disappointed. He attributed his defeat to the votes taken by the New Democratic party candidate. He lost to Margaret Macdonald, Canadian by 236.

The Souris man's "sure of victory" statement was in sharp contrast to 1953 when he was elected, and in 1957, when he was defeated. He had been uncertain of the result in the past, explained the man who put in his most strenuous campaign with a canvass of every vote prior to the June 18 polling date.

But there were no recriminations. He was expressing only appreciation to his workers and supporters who gave him "such solid backing."

George MacKay, Albany, who resigned his provincial cabinet seat to contest the Prince riding, was not available for comment yesterday.

FEDERATION OF AGRIC. NEWSLETTER Little Cause For Elation Is Seen Over Election

Few thoughtful people regard the party affiliation will have cause to be elated over the results of Monday's election. Indeed, in many, organization or nation usually leads to further trouble and complication. Canada apparently did not know what it wanted in the way of government, and the results of this indecision may be around to plague us even after another election is called.

Analysis of the results will produce all sorts of interesting conclusions. From an agricultural standpoint it is, of course, noteworthy that the three Prairie Provinces provided strong support (42 seats) for the government and after doing this treated the other three parties quite impartially with two seats each. For the grain farmer, the situation had improved in the last couple of years, and with the Wheat Board making the largest final payment ever (over 30 cents per bushel) of wheat money was circulating. In addition, the encouragement to produce more wheat made many western farmers hopeful that there might be relief from sloping hills and fusing with them a few cows, all occurrences of which they tend to tire easily.

Evidently the Ontario farmer looked at matters in a somewhat different light, but why the answer is not so clear. The province of Quebec divided its allegiance among the two old gods and embraced a new one quite strongly. Evidently Social Credit received strong support in rural areas. In the Maritimes no particular trend was evident other than the traditional one of not changing our minds too often or too much in a hurry.

RURAL-URBAN FEELING

On more than one occasion the Federation of Agriculture has been charged with fomenting rural and urban ill feeling and difference of opinion. Possibly the fact that the matter is referred to leads to the charge and the possibility of null by association. There will, of course, be much difference of opinion on the score of whether in this province there are basic conflicts of interest between town and country. However, my one with a sharp pencil "we" is that the trouble of adding up the vote of the Charlottetown and the vote of the rest of the country and making a comparison will not make that answer in any way clear.

There is a marked difference in the trend and the vote. We offer no conclusion, but suggest that some addition and subtraction
