**Crop Prospects.**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.

The London statistical agent of the Department of Agriculture reports to-day by cable that the weather of the first ten days of August has been hot and forcing, and an improvement in wheat prospects is noted in all European countries, with magnificent harvesting weather.

**A Ministerial Embezzler.**

LONDON, Aug. 11.

Kadyk Bey, formerly Turkish Minister of Finance, has been arrested at Smyrna for alleged speculation in which improper uses were made of funds belonging to the State Treasury.

**The Cholera.**

MARSEILLES, Aug. 11.

Fifteen deaths from cholera occurred here to-day. There have been two deaths at Toulon to-day. It is estimated that since the outbreak 8,000 persons have been attacked and 800 have died.

**A Liberal Procession.**

BRUSSELS, Aug. 11.

The Liberal demonstration here yesterday drew out a tremendous throng of people. The procession paraded in front of the Government offices, shouting "Resign!" and "Long live the King!"

**A Reinforcement.**

LONDON, Aug. 11.

The British force in Egypt now numbering 800 men, will be raised to 10,000, in view of the intention to send an expedition to Khartoum, to relieve Gen. Gordon.

**The Fall of Gallabat.**

CAIRO, Aug. 11.

Mason Bey telegraphs from Mansowah that Gallabat has fallen into the hands of rebels, and that the inhabitants of Gederif have been ordered to retire on Kassala.

**A Terrible Storm.**

PESTH, July 11.

A terrible storm raged throughout Upper Hungary yesterday. Rain fell in torrents and streams were raised to floods. Villages were swept away. Persons were drowned.

**Another Bank Closed.**

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.

Wall-Street Bank has just closed its doors owing to irregularities on the part of the cashier.

**Myriads of Locusts.**

VERA CRUZ, Mex. Aug. 11.

Myriads of locusts have appeared in this State, and great destruction to crops has resulted.

**The First Train.**

TORONTO, Aug. 11.

The first passenger train ran over the Canadian Pacific, from Toronto to Ottawa, to-day.

**The Fire Fiend.**

VIENNA, Aug. 11.

Isalo, a town of 2,000 people, in Austrian Galicia, was almost destroyed by fire yesterday.

**Bombardment of Kelung.**

LONDON, Aug. 11.

The French, yesterday, bombarded Kelung for an hour, and dismantled the fort.
