Very many persons in this province will
 bear with regret that Mr. William C. Gal-
 lagher, son of Mr. Patrick Gallagher, of the
 Hotel Minto, Moncton, died at the Holy
 Cross Novitiate, Montreal, on Saturday
 afternoon. The deceased young man
 graduated from St. Joseph's University in
 June, 1898, taking the degree of A.B., and
 entered the Jesuit Seminary at Montreal in
 the following July. While there he de-
 cided to join the Holy Cross Order and
 accordingly entered the Holy Cross Novitiate
 and began his study for the priest-
 hood. Being a young man of splendid
 talents he progressed rapidly in his high
 calling. He was seized with an attack
 of la grippe about three
 months ago, and had a hemorrhage from
 the nose which lasted for 48 hours, re-
 ducing the patient to death's door. His
 strong constitution, however, pulled him
 through, and it was thought he would
 recover. His rather sudden death is sup-
 posed to be due to a relapse. Deceased
 was born in Moncton, March 6, 1880, and
 was consequently in the 20th year of his
 age. At college he was an exemplary
 young man, a close student and a great
 favorite with his comrades. The remains
 were interred in the Holy Cross cemetery
 at Montreal to-day. The deceased was a
 nephew of Mr. J. F. Gallagher, who pre-
 sents Mauchester Robertson & Allison
 in this province.
