

# Park Suffers First Loss, Bows To Shamrocks 6-5

## IN IRISH SWEEP

### Millions Hang On Balance Sat.

LONDON (CP)—Millions of pounds hang in the balance on Saturday's Irish Sweep Derby, but few who buy tickets understand how the sweepstakes operates.

The draw that will determine the destination of prize money to be shared round the world is being completed in a big cream-painted building known as Sweepstakes Hall, in Ballsbridge, Dublin. Here's how it works:

Countertops of all sweepstakes tickets sold are placed in a large cylindrical drum, about 26 feet long by six feet in diameter. The drum contains 48 "porchets," arranged in rows.

At zero hour, Irish runners stand on a platform in front of the revolving drum. When the drum stops, the porchets open and the six numbers placed there have to be extracted a counter.

The counterfolts are collected by a police officer who clips them together, perforates them with a "secret" mark and passes them to a scrutineer.

**DRAW HORSES NAMES**  
The winning counterfolts are then photographed as the names drawn out of a glass drum the names of horses running in the race—in this case the derby to be run Saturday afternoon at the Curragh, a course some 20 miles southeast of Dublin. The names are linked with the counterfolts.

There are 26 prizes of £50,000 each for the winning horse, £20,000 for the second and £10,000 for the third. Holders of tickets on unplaced horses receive £600.

Of the money collected in the sweep, £1,500,000 goes to Irish Hospitals.

Twenty-six horses are listed as probable starters for the year's running of the Derby, worth some £20,000 to the win-

ing owner. Total purse money runs close to £70,000 making this the richest race ever run in Europe.

Some see the Irish classic eventually challenging the famous English Derby at Epsom for popularity and prestige. About 60,000 fans are expected at the Curragh compared with crowds of up to 800,000 at Epsom, which draws on the dense population of greater London.

Current favorite is the Irish horse Larkspur, winner of the June 8 Epsom Derby for American owner Raymond Guest. Other fanciers are Arctic Storm, the French horses Arco and Tambourine, and a sleeper named March Wind.

## Soviet Union Dominates In Wrestling

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP)—The Soviet Union continued its runaway in the Greco-Roman division of the world amateur wrestling championships Tuesday.

With some weights wrestled through the Russian and others still awaiting the second round, the Russians had won 16 matches in 16 tries, half of them by far behind in a battle for second place were Bulgarian, Turkey, Romania and Hungary. Bulgaria had a slight edge.

The United States lagged far behind.

## AFL To Appeal Suit Decision

BOSTON (AP)—The American Football League voted Tuesday to appeal its \$100,000 anti-trust suit against the six major professional football leagues.

AFL commissioner Joe Fox made the announcement at the league's annual meeting in Philadelphia.

He said the vote of the eight-member executive committee is appeal was unanimous.

U.S. District Court Judge Rosell Thomson ruled in Baltimore June 12 that the NFL had no monopsony.

Warren Burger, of Washington, lawyer for the AFL, said Justice Thomson "erred both in his findings and in his legal conclusion."

"I think we have a reasonable chance of a reversal in the decision, not just a remote chance," he said.

The trial lasted five weeks. The appeal will be heard next fall.
