WEDNESDAY, JUNE 25—EVENING SESSION.

Journal was read and approved; prayer by Mr. Stumbles. Several committees were formed. Amongst the rest were the Missionary and the Children's. Rev. H. Daniel was elected a member of the Transfer Committee.

Thanks were passed to the Post Office authorities for the facilities afforded this conference, and also to the owners of steamboats and railroads for their kindness in conveying members of this Conference to and fro at reduced rates. Rev. E. Evans was elected a member of the Missionary Committee. Benediction was pronounced by Rev. J. Burwash.

THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 26TH.

Journal read and approved. The Missionary Committee brought in their report. It was considered and passed.

It was ordered that the Conference take the necessary steps to obtain a seal. A report of the committee on the St. Andrew's report. It was passed.

Rev. G. Steel brought in report of the Children's Fund. It was received and considered, item by item. Some items were passed, but the matter was laid on the table. Session closed by benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference opened by prayer by Rev. C. H. Paisley, A. M. Journal read and approved. Rev. S. F. Huestis addressed the Conference on behalf of the interest of the Book Room. He stated that the sales for the year had been \$18,235, being an increase of \$387 in the year. It was a very complimentary report. The business had been conducted at a loss of \$1,045. Mr. Huestis said that no cheaper Sabbath School publications could be obtained elsewhere.

C. D. Whiteside, Esq., moved a vote of confidence with the Sabbath School publications of the Book Room. It was passed.

Rev. R. Duncan moved a vote of confidence in Rev. S. F. Huestis. Passed.

Conference then passed to the report of the Children's Fund Report. A motion by Rev. T. Marshall, in favor of a graduated system of payments, was not passed. On motion of John E. Irvine, Esq., it was resolved to lay the matter over for another year. In the meantime a large committee, composed equally of ministers and laymen, was to sit upon the matter and report some scheme of operation to the next conference. A lively and spirited discussion ensued.

Rev. J. R. Narraway, A. M., read the Pastoral Address. It referred to the happily consummated union with satisfaction. Hope was confidently expressed that the blessing of God might rest upon the union. It traversed the steps taken to bring about union. The address spoke of the congratulations received from the sister churches of the Dominion.

A motion was considered to the effect that laymen provide for themselves at the annual Conference. Several lay men spoke against making any distinction between ministerial and lay delegates. The motion was withdrawn. Benediction by Rev. E. Evans.

Impure Milk. The fact that much impure milk is being sold in New York has aroused the authorities to action. The other day one Louis O. Meyer was charged with selling milk from distillery-will-fed cows. One of the cows was found to have tuberculous consumption, and three pleuro-pneumonia; all were emaciated. The pleuro-pneumonia cow has since died. Meyer was fined \$500, and the Sanitary Engineer laments the nature of the sentence as follows:—But in view of the fact that the physicians examined were of the opinion that blood-poisoning, and, perhaps, consumption were likely to result from the use of such milk, we regret exceedingly that the Court did not see fit to impose the alternative of imprisonment, as wealthy scoundrels pay their fine, and generally go on with their villainy.

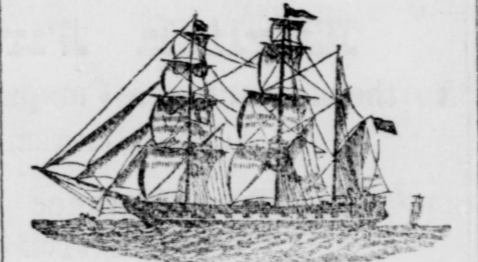
