The present crisis has been developing for considerable time and there is no logical reason why action was not taken before the crisis developed.

Mr. Shaw commented that for the past two weeks there has been announcements, proposals and suggestions through the press and television of an encouraging nature as to what would likely happen from day to day, but nothing of a definite solution has yet been announced.

The appointment of co-ordinators covering traffic at Wood Islands will not transfer extra care. This service on its own will do everything possible to carry out its responsibilities.

"Plans for small boats, trawlers and other suitable craft to carry our livestock to market is just so much woolgathering," he stated, and added "we need the full service of all the boats on the Borden-Tormentine route to care for our present needs. In the meantime, in absence of definite action, this province has lost a large income through our tourist industry."

"We have two strikes on our hands, before giving over power we had friendly consultation with our local labor representatives and the packers, and temporary arrangements were made to dispose of livestock on the mainland."

"And now," he said, "with the boats off the Borden route, our markets are virtually closed."

"This province faces the worst economic position in its history, and a situation more damaging than prevails in any other part of Canada."

"I am convinced," he stated, "that in view of the situation that a special session of the Legislature should have been called immediately, and it may not be too late yet in order to get our guidelines cleared and make provisions for a determined and influential approach by the legislators of this province and other influential groups at the federal level."

Mr. Shaw stated, "This is no time for nice, political consideration. I believe that if this had been done, action would have been taken before this, instead of fiddling around with practical suggestions that have not got us anywhere."

"I feel confident too," he said, "that discussions of a most friendly and frank nature could have been conducted on a broader front with union authorities both at Federal and Provincial levels in order to promote plans on a co-operative basis aimed at a more acceptable atmosphere in which to carry out these discussions."

He added, "in any event, I would like it to be distinctly understood that the party I represent are anxious to give fullest possible support in the formation of plans aimed at settlement and fullest co-operation on deciding on these plans with provincial authorities so that a strong approach can be made to the federal government where the main responsibility lies for settlement."

Famous Figure To Speak Here

In a dimly lit railway coach on Track 13 at New York Central noon meetings have been taking place now for quite a number of years. Leading these meetings which over this time have attracted thousands of people is a diminutive Red Cap by the name of Ralston Young, better known as Red Cap 42.

Ralston Young about 25 years ago found release from the cynicism and hatred that was in his life. He despised the job he had doing bags for people. In his own words, "He wanted to be somebody," but he realized he

could never become rich or hold any position of prestige. The release he found was a through an acceptance of the ideals and principles of the Christian Faith and shortly thereafter he began a personal programme of helping others. The noon meeting became the focal point but Red Cap 42 does not limit his helping ministry to alert to the needs of lonely and perplexed travellers with whom he comes in contact and the ways in which he helps them is most unique. Men and women in countless numbers from all walks of life can thank the little Red Cap for wise words of counsel and the genuine compassion he shows for their needs. The story of his life has been publicized in many American periodicals. Ten years ago this fall Ralston Young came to the first Stanhope Conference for men of the United Church and the planning committee of the conference was delighted when he accepted a repeat invitation.
