

Moncton Hawks Take Two Game Lead In Series By Defeating Ottawa Flyers 5-3

MONCTON, (CP)—Moncton Hawks whipped Ottawa RCAF Flyers 5-3 here Monday night to take a 2-0 lead in their best-of-seven Eastern Canada Allan Cup semi-finals.

Hawks romped to a 5-1 lead by the halfway point in the third period but the Flyers applied steam to their offensive machine to net a pair of goals in the last minute of play.

Moncton's goals were evenly split. Bob Bowness, an off-season insurance salesman, fired one in the first period, Yvon Houle and Ross Watson picked up the second and third in the middle period and Ray Lacroix and Lorne Watters wrapped it up in the last frame.

Pete Girouard connected for the Ottawa district champions in the middle period. Bill Franklin and Wayne Darch were the marksmen in the 11th-hour breakout which brought fans to their feet in the dying moments.

Play was fast the whole distance. Twelve penalties were called, Hawks getting nine of them. The third game of the series will be played here Wednesday and the fourth game Saturday. Any further games also will be played here.

Hawks won the Maritime title by dusting off New Glasgow Rangers earlier this month.

Canadiens Go Against Boston Tonight In Opener

MONTRÉAL, (CP)—Montreal Canadiens, still reeling from the loss of the National Hockey League championship, go against the Boston Bruins here tonight in the opener of a best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final.

Toronto Maple Leafs will meet the league winning Detroit Red Wings in Detroit.

The Canadiens, who appeared to have the NHL title clinched until they started blowing games right and left last week, will be with out the services of their star, Maurice Rocket Richard, suspended for the last three games of the regular schedule and the playoffs.

It will also be the first meeting between the teams since Richard clashed with Hal Laycoe of the Bruins and linesman Cliff Thompson in a stick-swinging duel that resulted in his suspension by NHL president Clarence Campbell.

To guard against a possible attack by the fans on Laycoe—similar to the one on Campbell that wound up in a full-scale riot last Thursday—police officials said they will have "plenty of men" at the Forum tonight.

NO CHANCES TAKEN
"We don't know if the fans will be after Laycoe's blood," a police spokesman said. "At any rate, we're not going to take any chances. There will be plenty of men on hand to nip any trouble before it starts."

There was no announcement from Campbell yet on whether he plans to attend after Thursday's riot, in which the fans smashed hundreds of windows and looted jewelry stores. The Forum management asked the NHL president to stay away from Saturday's game against the New York Rangers.
