THE NOVA SCOTIA BANK ROBBER PLANS TO ESCAPE FROM JAIL.

Steele, the bank robber, takes his imprisonment very coolly. As yet he has not evinced any great uneasiness regarding his probable fate, unless upon one occasion, when told that Currie was worse. He then seemed so solicitous that every effort should be made to save Currie, the bank manager into whom he fired two bullets, and suggested an abundant use of poultices to keep down the fever. Steele had not been locked up half an hour before he began to plan his escape. He was overheard talking over his plan with another prisoner. At the same time he also threatened to attack and kill his jailer if a suitable opportunity occurred. Preparations were taken at once to render his escape impossible. Extra bars were put on the window and door of the cell and a watchman employed. Afterwards the sheriff received a letter from the attorney-general, directing him to take every care to prevent the prisoners' escape. As the latter still talked of escape and of confederates, it was deemed expedient to shackle him. Numerous stories are told indicative of his cold-blooded ferocity. His old grandmother once ventured to give him some kindly advice as to his conduct. He interrupted her with imprecations. Opening his vest he displayed two revolvers, and said if he thought she had a "ten dollar bill" on her, he would split her heart instantly. On another occasion he was a bit put off by putting three bullets all in a bunch into a stake three inches wide at sixty paces.—Antigonish Echo.

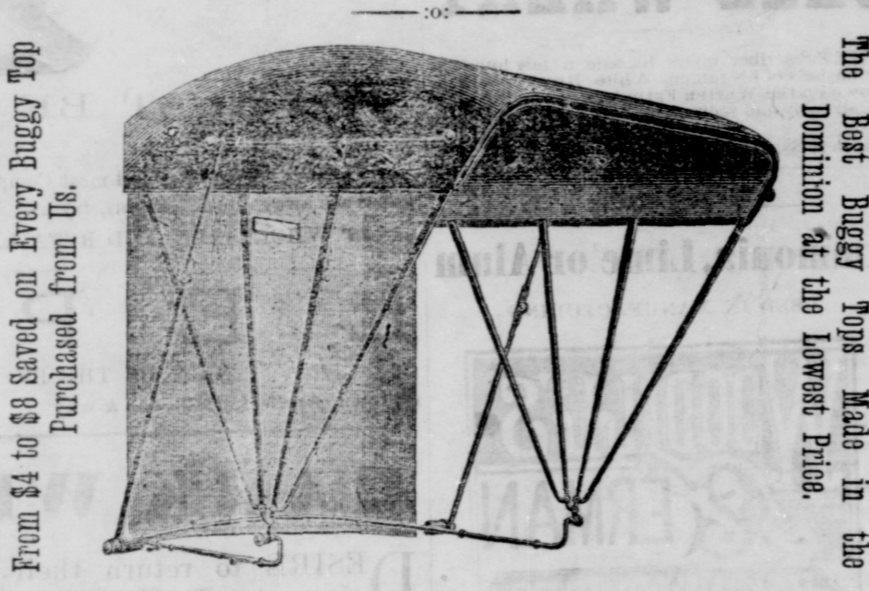
