Canadiens Wallop Leafs Black Hawks Bruins Win

TORONTO (CP) - Montreal Canadiens, led by captain Jean Beliveau's two-goal performance, overpowered Toronto Maple Leafs 7-2 in a rugged National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

The game before 14,996 fans ended with a fight between defenceman Kent Douglas of the third-place Leafs and left-winger John Ferguson of the Canadiens.

The two square off at centre ice and when officials separated them Ferguson, rated one of the best fighters in the league, was bleeding from the face.

In addition to his two goals, which brought his season total to 26, Beliveau had three assists. Other Montreal scorers were Bobby Rousseau, Gilles Tremblay, Claude Larose, Ralph Backstrom and Dave Balon.

Ron Ellis and Dave Keon scored for Toronto. STAY ON TOP The victory kept the Canadiens in first place in the standings ahead of the second-place Chicago Black Hawks while the loss was the second in a row for the Leafs, who have now won six, tied three and lost three against Montreal.

Tempers were quick throughout the game and so were the goals. Montreal opened the scoring at the nine-second mark when Rousseau flipped the puck into the right-hand corner of the net behind starting Leaf goalie Bruce Gamble.

Hal Lanier drove in three runs with a homer and a pair of singles for the Giants, who had to overcome an early 3-1 California lead.

Kansas City Athletics rocked Pittsburgh veteran Vern Law for eight runs in the first three innings. Ken Harrelson cracked a two-run homer for the Athletics.

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MURRAY OLIVER

Gilles Tremblay put Montreal ahead 2-0 at the 40-second mark when he broke in with Beliveau. Larose for Montreal and Ellis for Toronto made it 3-1 Montreal at the end of the period.

LEFT GAME Gamble, called up from Tulsa of the Central Professional League two weeks ago, was the victim of three fast Montreal markers early in the second period and finally had to leave the game with a leg injury at 15:18 of the second after making a save against Beliveau.

He was replaced by Johnny Bower, out since Feb. 27 with a groin injury.

CHICAGO 4 DETROIT 1 CHICAGO (AP) - A pair of goals by Phil Esposito led Chicago Black Hawks to a 4-1 victory over Detroit Red Wings in a sloppy National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

The triumph, their 11th of the year over the Wings, kept the Hawks a point behind league-leading Montreal Canadiens who beat Toronto Maple Leafs 7-2 Wednesday night.

Included in the Chicago attack was Bobby Hull's 53rd goal of the year. It came mid-way in the second period after Esposito's 25th and 26th goals of the year and defenceman Doug Jarvis' fourth had put the Hawks comfortably in front.

Detroit's tally came at 6:56 of the final period when Val Fonteyne scored from a scramble in front of Chicago goalie Glenn Hall.

Esposito opened the scoring at 5:50 of the first period, a few seconds after Bruce MacGregor of the Wings was penalized for holding. Esposito caught the Detroit defence near centre ice and sneaked behind to take a pass from Stan Mikita and go in alone against Detroit goalie Roger Crozier.

Jarrett took a pass from behind the net by Hull and slammed a 30-footer into the Wings' goal at 10:47 of the opening period.

Esposito came up with his second of the night in the opening minutes of the second period while Gordie Howe of Detroit was serving a carryover penalty from the first period.

Esposito broke around the Wing defence along the left boards and beat Crozier with a 20-footer into the opposite corner of the net.

Hull's 53rd was a deflection of Pat Stapleton's long shot from the point at 10:43.

Hall was bombarded by 38 shots by the Wings, while Crozier was tested only 20 times.

Skov had plenty of work in the second period with New York's Reg Fleming the main combatant. Fleming went 48 it with Don Awrey just 18 seconds after Bucyk's first goal.

Both drew major penalties and Awrey seemed to get the worst part of the fight, losing his jersey in the melee.

Later Ron Stewart of Boston took on Ranger defenceman Wayne Hillman with both getting majors and minors.

Fleming had his second fight of the period with less than three minutes remaining when he chased after and caught Johnny McKenzie. Reg got three minors for that episode and McKenzie wound up with a cut on his forehead and four minutes in penalties.

The Rangers outshot the Bruins 43-25, but Boston goalie Ed Johnston did a workmanlike job keeping New York at bay.

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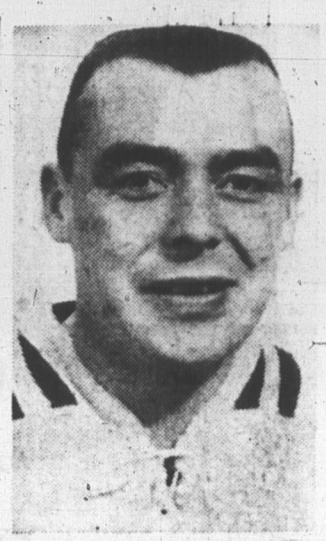
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
