NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Toronto, May 5.—2.30 a. m. Senator Brown was still alive at midnight, but is very low. He was conscious at times yesterday, but the doctors held out little or no hope, and the members of his family have been summoned to his bedside. There is a conviction that he cannot hold out much longer. Should the event prove otherwise it will be a great surprise.

CINCINNATI, May 1. A desperate affray occurred in Wayne Co., Kentucky, on Thursday. A man named Powell, who was witness of the killing last fall, of Hutchinson by Phillips, has been threatened by Phillips in order to keep him from testifying. Powell refused to leave the country or accept a bribe. On Thursday night six or seven masked men attacked Powell's house, broke in the door with a rail, when Powell struck three down with an axe. Mrs. Powell was shot in the arm. The maskers retreated but again returned, when Powell fired and killed the leader. Powell obtained warrants for the arrest of three men who are now in jail.

CHICAGO, May 4. Grant left on Monday for Springfield, Ill., where he goes on the invitation of the citizens to visit the late home of Abraham Lincoln, and where he will be the guest of Gov. Cullom. He was accompanied by E. B. Washburne.

ELMIRA, N. Y., May 4. A terrible tragedy took place at Penn Yan, this morning. Mrs. George Woodruff, during the temporary absence of her husband from home, took her two sleeping children from bed—one aged six and the other one year—and, going to the cistern, drowned both. She is undoubtedly insane.

LONDON, May 4. A correspondent of the "Telegraph" at Berlin says that a well informed St. Petersburg correspondent writes that war between Russia and China is nearly certain.

HONG KONG, April 7, via LONDON, May 4. Affairs between China and Russia are still threatening. A conflict is reported between the troops of the two nations on the Ili frontier. Chung How, late Ambassador to Russia and the contractor of the treaty at Livadia, has been sentenced to decapitation. The French difficulty with Anam is settled. The Chinese in Hong Kong have subscribed liberally to the Irish famine fund.

DUBLIN, May 4. Capt. Potter of the "Constellation" was presented with the freedom of the city of Dublin. Lord Mayor Grey, who presided at the ceremony, stated that this distress in Ireland was as great as ever, and he feared that during the next three months it would prove most severe.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 4. The ambassadors have presented a note to the Porte asking a categorical statement whether it intends to re-occupy the ceded positions in Albania and hand them over to the Montenegrins.

PARIS, Ky., May 4. On Monday morning upon opening the Citizens' Bank it was discovered that the vault had been entered. The burglars did not get into the main safe but found a box containing \$499 and a package containing \$19,500 in bonds belonging to two ladies.

PARIS, May 4. A railway contractor was murdered on Friday night by a fellow passenger, in a compartment of the first class carriage of the Marseilles and Lyons express train. The purpose was robbery. The murderer was arrested.

LONDON, May 4. A large supply of lint bandages has been requested of the lady President of the Red Cross Society, presumably for an expedition to the Chinese frontier, or for Skobeloff's command.

LONDON, May 4. It is stated that a break has occurred in the new French cable.

ROME, May 4. All the newspapers, unfavorable to the Government, sharply criticize the dissolution of the Chamber. Signor Crispi's organ the "Quotidiano" has been sequestered for an offence against the person of the King.

PARIS, May 4. The debate in the Deputies over the proscription of the Jesuits is about to recommence, and will be a bitter one.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 4. At the Czar's banquet in the Winter Palace to the officers of the Guard, the only diplomat present was the German Ambassador Werner. The Empress of Russia has had several delirious attacks within a few days. Gortschakoff's condition has not improved.

THE CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT.—The House of Commons, by a vote of 95 to 73, adopted Boulbee's amendment to the Canada Temperance Act, providing that it shall only go into force when a clear majority of all voters in the electoral district shall be recorded in favor of it. A motion, subsequently made, to throw out the amended bill was negatived by a vote of 86 to 54.
