## SOUTH AFRICA UP TO DATE.

### Opinions Concerning Proposed Conference.

BOER WOMEN VERY WARLIKE

The Dutch Arming in Fear that Sir Alfred Milner Will Dismiss Schreiner.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Sept. 1.—The Pretoria correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says that President Kruger is not likely to agree to a conference with Sir Alfred Milner at Capetown, but will go to Johannesburg, just within the border.

The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "Much disappointment is felt here at the proposal of a conference as tending to prolong the agony indefinitely.

The Johannesburg Standard and Diggers News of Johannesburg, describes the Boer women as very warlike. They are forming rifle clubs in many districts and petitioning the Transvaal Government against granting the franchise to the Uitlanders on the basis of a five year residence.

BLONFONTEIN, Orange Free State, Sept. 1.—It is asserted by a local newspaper that orders have been given for the immediate supply of cartridges for the Orange Free State artillery.

LONDON, Sept. 1.—The Daily Chronicle publishes the following from Cape Town: "It is rumoured here that Sir Alfred Milner, Governor of Cape Colony, contemplates dismissing the Schreiner Ministry under his special powers. If he does so, it is feared that rebellion will break out; for the Dutch would believe that the British Government is again forcing Cecil Rhodes to the front.

Chinese Notes.

Chinese pirates are making great depredations in Saichin, and the people desire the substitution of British authority.

The Emperor is suspected of being systematically starved by his enemies. He is afraid some of his ministers may prove traitorous to him. A missionary station in Chinese Tibet has been attacked by the natives, the missionaries barely escaping with their lives.

The plague is still raging in Hong Kong. The deaths since the middle of December have averaged 100 a week. Despite all precautions it is very hard to obstruct its entrance from the mainland. Only one white man has died as yet. But when a native is attacked he leaves the island to prevent the expense of burial and fumigation. The whites and Indians have little fear of catching the plague as it is said the disease is acquired by direct infection of the plague microbe from infected things in the street into an abrasion in the foot. The hot summer is coming, and, as it has been proved that it cannot live under a hot sun, its disappearance is hoped for.

## THE PARISIAN DAMAGED

Scrapes Her Sides While Going Down the St. Lawrence.

MONTREAL, Sept. 1.—While the Allan liner Parisian, which sailed from here yesterday morning, was on her way down the channel a short distance from Montreal, her steering gear got out of order and she scraped her plates against the sides of the channel sustaining considerable injury. As she was taking water, it was decided to stop at Contrecoeur, near Sorel, and tugs and lighters were sent to her assistance. It is expected that after being lightened, the Parisian will be able to proceed to Quebec, where the necessary repairs will be made to enable her to continue her voyage.

## DEATH ON A BICYCLE

Oliver Melanson Expires as a Result of Heart Failure.

MONTON, Sept. 1.—At Shediac, last evening, Oliver Melanson, aged 22, while riding on his bicycle near the railway station was noticed to fall over suddenly and was supposed to have fainted. Prompt assistance was rendered and restoratives applied, but he died in a few minutes from heart failure. A slight abrasion on the forehead was the only injury discovered. The deceased was a nephew of O. M. Melanson, M. P. P.

## THE NORTH WEST CROPS

How it Will be Moved to the Coast.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 31.—General Superintendent Osborne, of the Canadian Pacific railway, questioned about the harvest, said:—"Our reports show that in the Greta country all wheat is cut; in Emerson district 75 per cent.; and from other points throughout the province reports state that from ten to 40 per cent is cut. My estimate is that between 35 and 40 per cent of the total wheat yield of the province is now cut.

"The weather has been most favorable everywhere. Not a station in Manitoba reports frost, only Rosser reports 3 per cent. damage by hail.

"As to moving the crop, we have 25,000 cars, including over 1,500 new ones added for this year's crop. Our P. & N. shops, which turned out six to ten new cars per day all the past year, have now increased the number to 15 per day."

## Salaries Going up,

OTTAWA, Aug. 31.—Mr. Sifton has decided to add a thousand dollars to Ogilvie's salary making it six thousand a year.

Proprietors of seven leading hotels were summoned before the police magistrate today and fined for selling liquor after hours. The license department at Toronto, moved to action by a complaint from temperance people at Ottawa, sent a Montreal detective here with this result.

## GREAT COPPER DEPOSIT.

Extends Fifty Miles in British Territory.

An immense copper belt is now known to extend from White Horse rapids, on the Yukon River, to a point on the Dalton trail, forty miles from the Lynn canal. It is over fifty miles in extent, and lies in British territory. The first outcroppings of this belt were discovered two years ago by Henry Brantnaber, a mining expert, representing the Rothschilds, of London, who have a party of men developing claims near the Hootchi and Dalton trails. The richness and great extent of this copper belt are confirmed by Captain Jarvis, of the North-West Mounted Police, who was in the district several weeks ago and is now returning there with a large exploring party. Jarvis says the quartz taken on assays 38 to 53 per cent copper, and there is apparent no end to the deposit. Hundreds of claims have been staked. The district is just beyond the Porcupine placer field, and eight miles from the international boundary. It is reached by trail from Hanes' mission, and an easy waterway is available for taking the product to tide-water.

The richest copper lodes are those near White Horse rapids. Four thousand acres are staked there, one company of 22 men having thirty-six acres. They have filed water rights at Perennial rapids, at Miles Canyon, with a view of working the mines by electricity. In one place there are 150,000 tons of copper quartz in sight, worth \$60 a ton. The quartz also carries good values in silver and free-milling gold. The development of claims with machinery on a large scale will be begun next season.

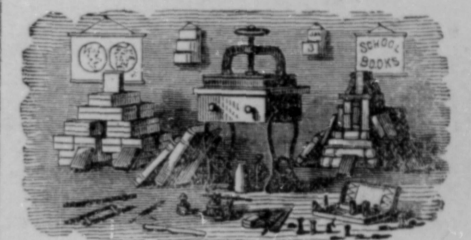
