

Seamen's Strike Said "Illogical"

LONDON, Reuters — Crews of two British ships in Montreal striking for Canadian pay rates while trading in Canadian waters have taken an "illogical" stand, a union official said here today.

Tom Yates, 58, general secretary of the National Union of Seamen, said the situation goes beyond his union's jurisdiction.

"How can we support them?" he asked. "A seaman signs a contract in this country and his wages and conditions are based upon the economy of this country."

"If their ship was on the Indian coast do they think we should agree that they should receive the Indian rates, which are about a third of those in Britain? It is illogical."

Yates was commenting on the strike of the 30-man crew of the British collier, "Cibouin," which sailed with the 18 union mates in the freighter, "Sheldrake," who were arrested last Saturday. The Cibouin men are reported to be trying to enforce their demands for higher pay.
