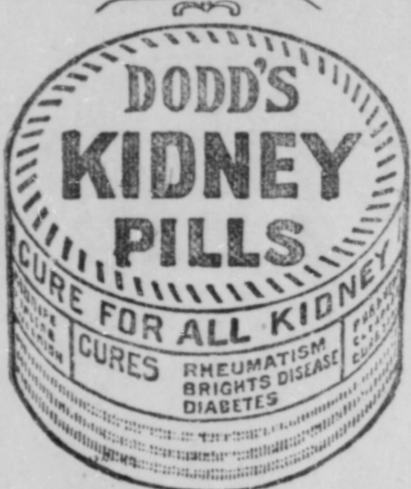

BEATING THE RECORD.

Good Liberals who heard Sir Richard declaiming against extravagance, and Sir Wilfrid promising to cut down the expenditure by four millions of dollars may be excused if they regard with astonishment the proposed outlay of the current and of the coming fiscal years.

For the present year, ending June 30, the amount voted last session was \$40,964,813 on revenue account, and \$6,935,673 on capital account—\$47,900,487 altogether.

Now we have supplementary estimates to the tune of \$2,188,409, which bring the figure for this year up to \$50,088,896.

In 1896 we spent \$36,949,142 out of revenue and \$5,425,505 on capital account, or both together \$42,374,647.

The economists have raised the outlays by \$7,709,000.

For the coming year commencing July 1, the sum of \$46,286,550 is asked as a preliminary. But the supplementary proposals have to come, and there is no knowing how high these will be.—Mail and Empire.

Sir Wilfrid Blunders Again

Sir Wilfrid Laurier now practically admits that the Teslin Lake railway scheme, thrown out by the Senate, was a blunder.

He thinks it would be wrong to build up a Pacific coast terminal point on territory whose possession is a matter of dispute between Canada and the United States.

By making that statement publicly he has committed another serious blunder.

Our neighbours will take it as tantamount to a confession of weakness in Canada's case.

They will infer that this country has little faith in the strength of its claims to the territory in question when our Premier declines to contribute to the building up of any towns there.

If Sir Wilfrid has consulted Canada's interests he would have kept the reasons for the change in his Yukon railway policy to himself.—Mail and Empire.

Kruger's Statement.

PRETORIA, June 15.—The Volksraad has resolved to accept President Kruger's franchise proposals and refer them to the people before putting them into operation.

President Kruger, in thanking the Raad said that in these troublesome times they could not know what was going to happen, England had not made even one little concession, and he could not give more. He reminded the Raad that God had always stood by them. War, he asserted, he did not want, but he would not relinquish anything more. In concluding, he called them all to witness that though their independence had once been removed God had restored it.

The Treason Trials.

PRETORIA, June 15.—The trial of the alleged former British officers, who were arrested in Johannesburg on May 16 last, on the charge of high treason, in having attempted to enroll men with a view to a rebellious outbreak, which began here on June 9, terminated to-day. The prisoners were remanded.

For the Philippines.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—The following order has been issued by direction of Acting Secretary Meiklejohn:

The 24th and 25th Infantry coloured regiments will assemble at San Francisco, California, and there put in readiness for duty in the Philippine Island.

Dickens Manuscripts.

LONDON, June 14.—The sale of William Wright's collection of Dickens' manuscripts at the literary auction rooms of Sotheby, Wilkinson and Hodge today brought heavy prices. A first edition of the original parts of "Pickwick Papers," inscribed "To Mary Hogarth," brought 100 guineas, and other presentations brought respectively 63, 36 and 28 guineas. "The original drawing on the frontispiece by "Phiz," and remarks in Dickens's hand writing brought 80 guineas, and a remarkably well-preserved edition of "Pickwick Papers" was sold for 85 guineas.

AGAINST LICENSING LIQUOR

Important Resolution Passed by the Summerside Ministerial District.

At the regular ministerial session of the Summerside Methodist District, the following resolution was adopted:—

Whereas,—This District Meeting has learned that the Legislature of this Province has passed a License Act, permitting for a consideration, the open sale of intoxicating liquors in Charlottetown;

And whereas,—It is apparent the commission to the Liquor traffic at the Capital must react upon the Temperance sentiment of the Province at large and encourage the promoters of the traffic to renew their efforts to revive the traffic in the counties:

And whereas,—We believe that such a step would be of a decidedly retrogressive character and would inevitably prove extremely damaging to the moral and material interests of the Province;

And whereas,—For the foregoing and many other reasons we, as a church, are determined and unalterably opposed to the Government of this country entering into a kind of partnership with the nefarious traffic and deplore the fact that we are per force compelled to participate in the profits arising therefrom;

Therefore resolved,—That we do condemn most unqualifiedly the Legislation referred to above and trust that the Temperance workers of Charlottetown will, at the first opportunity, make every possible effort for the re-enslaving of the Scott Act.

And further,—That we urge our people throughout this district to be upon the alert lest the enemy should steal a march upon them and by the devious methods for which the friends of the traffic are notorious, may succeed in weakening the position which has already been gained as the result of so much toil and sacrifice on the part of the Temperance people of this section of the Province.

Death of William Hooper.

The Hon. William Hooper, who for many years represented the Morell district in the Local Legislature, died at his home, Marie, on the 5th inst., aged 75. The funeral on the 7th inst., to Midgell cemetery was one of the largest we have ever seen. The pall-bearers were James Hogan, Esq., Edward Jardine, Esq., Benj Hayden, Esq., Hon. A. McLaughlin, M P P., John McGregor, Esq., John Larkin, Esq. The deceased returned from California about a year ago, where he had been on a four years' visit to his family, nine of whom are in comfortable circumstances in that State. Since then he suffered from stomach and liver trouble, and the end came suddenly, he being confined to his bed only two days. Mr. Hooper came to this province from England about fifty years ago. He, before the days of the railroad, was contractor for carrying the mails from Charlottetown to East Point. Mr. Hooper was a man that to know was to admire. Upright and honest in his dealings, his character was exemplary, of a quiet and gentlemanly nature, he had a host of friends. By his death, a kind father, a good citizen, and a loyal and patriotic British subject has gone to his reward. His bereaved family and friends have our sympathy in this great loss.

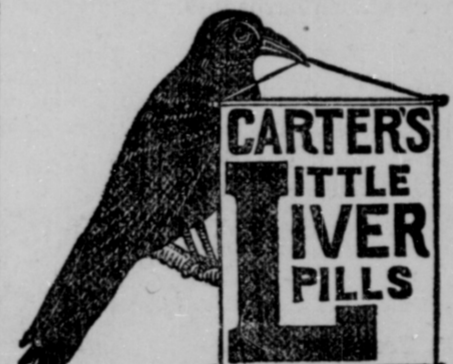
