**Political Rumblings Continue In Wake Of Atia. Resignation**

EDMONTON (CP) — Continued political rumblings in Alberta four weeks after the resignation of Provincial Premier E. W. Hinman have brought demands for more information in some quarters, and a strong denial of any improper resignation by Premier E. C. Manning said July 28 the resignation was requested because Mr. Hinman's former and operation of the non-government enterprise was incompatible with his public office.

Demands for opposition parties for more information on Mr. Hinman's interest were echoed during the weekend by the provincial council of the New Democratic Party. It asked the premier to issue a complete statement giving details of the former treasurer's business associations which led to his resignation.

**NEWSPAPER COMMENTS**

In a front-page editorial, the Edmonton Journal, an independent newspaper, says "on the basis of what we know, we state the following categorically: 'That there is no evidence on the record to indicate any impropriety or misconduct by any member of the cabinet, including Mr. Hinman and Mr. Hoque. (A. J. Hoque, minister of municipal affairs).

"That certain vague allegations have been made in various quarters about Mr. Hoque, but there is no evidence to support these allegations.

"That Mr. Hinman's resignation resulted from a genuine difference of opinion between him and the premier, and that what does or does not constitute a conflict of interest, and nothing in the public view, the premier's attitude was correct, there was no outright impropriety involved."

On Aug. 7, Premier Manning

asked for a comment. Mr. Hoque declared that Mr. O'Dwyer still had not said anything on anything that may say.

**REQUEST NAMES**

The NDP council passed a resolution asking that Premier Manning disclose the names of persons he maintains are part of the "clique."

It also passed a resolution asking that the Alberta government investigate treasury branches which operate similar to banks under the provincial treasury department. The NDP gave no reason for its request.

The council further urged the premier to investigate whether there is evidence of resignations governing the conduct of members in the work of Dr. Lou Heald, Social Credit mem-

ber for Edmonton North East as administrator of a chiropractors' fund which handles chiropractic treatment for pensioners.

The fund comes from provincial government contributions of \$120 for each pensioner each year to the Alberta Chiropractic Association. Dr. Heald could not be reached for comment on the request.

Delegates to the NDP council said there was a possibility Premier Manning might call a special election because of rumors and speculation surrounding the cabinet. The council asked confidence representatives to appoint campaign managers and announce nomination committees "as soon as possible."

A general election in Alberta last year was held on the 28th of the 83 seats. There are two Liberal and one coalition member. A January election resulted in no change. If Premier Manning's nomination is accepted, the next general election will be in 1967.

Premier Manning's office said he had no comment on the NDP statements.

On Aug. 11, Thomas O'Dwyer, an Edmonton business man, said he may have been a member of the group mentioned by the premier. On Saturday, he was quoted by the Calgary Alberta as saying he was at a meeting in an Edmonton home and Mr. Hoque was present.

The newspaper quoted Mr. O'Dwyer as saying "indications of ministerial misconduct were made against Mr. Hoque."

Asked for a comment, Mr. Hoque declared that Mr. O'Dwyer still had not said anything on anything that may say.

**Refinishing Furniture Can Be A Tough Battle**

**TORONTO (CP)** — Elbow grease and patience are the most important requirements for a furniture refinisher. The client depends on the kind of wood and the type of finish you want.

The first step is cleaning off the old finish, and it should be done carefully and completely. "Don't scrape wood," says Herb Edwards, foreman finisher at Ripid's, a Toronto furniture firm. It does too much damage. Use a paint or varnish remover.

"The main thing is to get the wood clean. Get it all cleaned off and the battle is won. One of the greatest mistakes people make is not cleaning off a wax remover. They don't bother to wash it down well enough—the wax clings and varnish won't dry over it."

To take off wax or old paint that has worked into the grain, Mr. Edwards recommends using alcohol or lacquer thinner or a strong solution of soda or soluble cleaning compound after you have finished with the varnish remover.

If the old finish is really stubborn, use steel wool with the cleaners to get out the last specks. "It's hard work and it's a boring job," says Mr. Edwards, "but you can do it."

**SMOOTH THE SURFACE**

Once the wood is clean, sand it to take dents out. Fill any deep gouges with plastic wood. Mr. Edwards says professionals use a braining stick that isn't usually available at retail outlets, but a local expert may be able to tell you where to get some.

"You can use almost anything to fill a hole. Then smooth it down and color it."

A filler stain to put on the first color is next. "On mahogany use a spirit stain to bring out the golden glow or teal. There is another kind of filler to choke up the grain. Use it mostly on walnut, mahogany or oak."

Mr. Edwards says some people fill the grain on real wood to give it the hard, glossy look of artificial woods, but he disapproves.

Less-expensive white woods with little natural color or grain are stained with a color stain. Wood that has been painted and is to be painted again shouldn't be filled, only two fresh coats.
