regulations. Mr. James gave a few examples of "what spirited men are doing to extend public education in the cause of safety. They print and tell the stories, tell you and me, and the public at large, where accidents occur; how they occur. They print and tell about repeated accidents at dangerous corners, about revised by-laws, about legal cases that arise out of accidents, where roads are treacherous and slippery."

In concluding his report he said, "So we revert back to education as a number one requirement if we are going to reduce the number of accidents and deaths on our highways and streets."

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2-Year Term For Jail Breaking At Summerside

George MacDonald, Summerside appearing on his fourth offense of breaking out of Prince County Jail was yesterday given a tougher assignment when he appeared before Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C., and was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary. After MacDonald's latest escape he had been picked up by police in Saint John, N. B., and returned to Summerside by the R. C. M. P. Another prisoner, Austin Smith, who escaped at the same time is still at large.

Swedish Freighter En Route To Windsor, N.S.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 7.—(AP) The Liberian freighter Mily docked here Monday, en route to Windsor, N. S., bringing with it a small corner of the iron curtain.

Capt. Oskar Rander, the vessel's Swedish master, invoked an iron curtain of his own when he refused to identify the 26-member crew, including three women.

Most of them were Estonian displaced persons who had fled Russian domination in their country, he explained, and have relatives still living in Estonia.

A Russian agent might read their names in the paper and it would go hard with their families at home," Rander said.

After a routine check, United States immigration authorities ordered crew members to be held aboard ship because the master neglected to show the crew list to the American consul in Hamburg before the ship sailed, as required by law.

The ship brought 1,300 tons of muriate of potash here. After unloading, it will sail to Windsor, N. S., where it will take on a cargo of lumber for France.
