**MAJOR MARCHAND
IS NOW IN CAIRO**

**Is Gratified with Kindness
Shown Him.**

**NO STATEMENTS WILL BE GIV-
EN TO THE PUBLIC.**

**Everything Will be Done to Promote
Harmony in Negotiating.**

CAIRO, Nov. 4.—Major Marchand arriv-
ed here today from Fashoda and Khar-
toum.

Only the Senegalese soldiers accom-
panied Major Marchand, whose future
movements depend upon instructions
which Captain Barratier brings him today
at French agency.

It was formerly announced that no one
would be permitted to interview the
French officer as M. Delcasse, French
Minister of Foreign Affairs and the Mar-
quis of Salisbury must be the first to
receive all news which may contribute to
harmony of the two countries.

The Major reports that he left all his
companions in good health and he adds
that they had abundant provisions and a
plentiful supply of ammunition.

The French commander expressed him-
self as being much gratified at the kind-
ness shown him by the British officers
during his journey.

SPAIN OBJECTS TO THE TERMS.

**Trouble Likely to Break out, Again
With the States.**

LONDON, Nov 4.—The Times correspon-
dent says that Spain being unable to accept
the terms imposed by the United States
will withdraw from the peace commission
today, and appeal to the European powers
to prevent the execution of an injustice.

The correspondent adds that grave trou-
ble is likely to be precipitated, and the
prospects of an European war greatly in-
creased.

All Ready for War.

Big Monitor.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The navy de-
partment is considering the advisability of
modifying the plans for the four new
harbor monitors by increasing their size
from 2,700 tons to 4,000 tons, enabling
them to carry four 12 inch guns in two
turrets instead of only two guns in one
turret.

A Treaty Port Seized—

LONDON, Nov 3.—The despatch from
Wei-Hai-Wei announcing the war pre-
parations of the British naval authorities
there is regarded here as being of grave
importance, coupled with the Anglo-French
war preparations. It is surmised that
Russia, profiting by the present strained
relations between Great Britain and France
has decided to push forward her claims in
the far east by forcibly seizing the valu-
able treaty port of New Chwang, which
Great Britain cannot permit, it is said.

A despatch from London to the Asso-
ciated Press, on October 20th, said a cable
had been received there from Shanghai
announcing the occupation of New Chwang
also written Niu-Chwang, by Russian
troops. The despatch was work-
ed as follows: "A Russian regi-
ment occupied the town of Niu
Chwang, province of the Lea-Tung, and
the forts at the river Liaou, on October 16,
thus securing complete possession of Niu-
Chwang. The native troops fled without
making any opposition under orders from
the Empress Dowager and Li Hung Chang.
A British gunboat was in the river at the
time. Its non-resistance is regarded as the
virtual British abandonment of the whole
of Manchuria to the Russians and gives
Russia an individual strategic position.
Great Britain is certain to lose the Niu-
Chwang trade, of which it has 80 per cent.

Signs of the Times.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The news received
by the Associated Press detailing the hos-
tilities in the Chinese waters goes far to explain
the recent uneasiness manifested on the
London exchange, in spite of the apparent
subsidence of the Anglo-French contro-
versy. The movement of securities un-
deniably shows the progress of impor-
tant diplomatic movements among the old
world powers, carrying with them the
threat of open rupture. There was a sharp
decline in consols and a strong market in
Liverpool for wheat, which only yielded
on the failure of the American markets to
respond fully because of the large receipts
at primary points and the liquidation of
large speculative lines in Chicago.

Customs Receipts.

MONTREAL, Nov 3.—Not since 1890
have the customs receipts at this port for
October been approached. Last month
they amounted to \$683,721, and when they
were nearly equalled in 1890 it was owing
to the heavy duty on sugar, which has
been greatly reduced. The receipts at
this port for the first four months of the
fiscal year beginning July 1 amount to
\$3,183,000, against \$2,331,291 for the
corresponding period last year.

A New Arrangement.

MONTREAL, Nov 3.—The leading officials
of the Intercolonial railway from
Moncton, N. B., including C. Pottinger,
general manager; J. J. Wallace, general
freight agent; and J. M. Lyons, general
passenger agents; have been in the city for
the past few days, and their business is
understood to be connected with the fram-
ing of a new agreement with the C. P. R.
for the running of the latter's trains over
the Intercolonial railway from St. John to
Halifax. It will be remembered that a
year ago last July, Hon. Mr Blair, minister
of railways, gave a year's notice of the
termination of the agreement then in effect,
and on its expiry last July, the old con-
tract was allowed to run, and has since
been in effect. The I. C. R. officials have
gone to Ottawa to lay certain matters
before Hon. Mr. Blair, and before their
return it is expected the new agreement
will be ready for the C. P. R. to sign.

Fleets Ready for War.

WEI HAI WEI, China, Nov 3.—All
the British warships here, the first class
battleship Centurion, the first class cruiser
Narcissus, the second class cruiser Her-
minone, the torpedo boat destroyer Fame,
the torpedo boat destroyer Handy and the
first class gunboat Peacock, have cleared
for action and are ready for sea at an
hour's notice. The first class battleship
Victorious and the first class cruiser
Undaunted, at Chee Foo, not far from here,
are coaling to their full capacity. The
greatest secrecy is maintained as to the
meaning of these warlike preparations, but
there is no doubt important instructions
are expected at any moment. A large
Russian fleet is assembled at Port Arthur.

Caravan Attacked.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Rome correspon-
dent of the Daily Mail says: "The govern-
ment has received news from Massowab,
on the Red Sea, that a thousand Danakils,
members of a tribe under Italian protec-
tion, recently attacked a caravan near
Jibuti on the west coast of the gulf of
Aden, belonging to the Abyssinian envoys
who were returning from Paris to the
court of the Emperor Menelik, of Abyssinia,
with M. Legarde the representative of the
French government and late governor of
Obak.

**SIR WILFRID
AND PROHIBITION**

**Deputation Received With
Honeyed Words.**

**BUT THEIR HOPES WERE DASH-
ED TO THE GROUND.**

**The Premier Adroitly Evades Their
Petition.**

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier
received the representatives of prohibition
to-day with honeyed words of praise.

The deputation went away in right good
humor; but when they emerged from the
Parliament buildings and bought a copy
of the local ministerial organ and there
read the discussion of the ministry, which
Laurier had not announced, their hopes
are decided on to the ground.

The Free Press announcement was as
follows:

"Considering the fact that not one quarter
of the electors of Canada have announced
their support of the principle of prohibi-
tion the executive does not feel warranted
in going any further in the matter."

Cape Colony's Contribution.

CAPE TOWN, Nov 3.—In the Cape Col-
ony assembly yesterday the Hon W P
Schremer, the premier, introduced a bill
proposing an annual contribution by the
colony of £86,000 to the British navy.

POST OFFICE ON WHEELS.

**U. S. Postal Authorities to Make
an Interesting Experiment**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov 1.—The Pos-
t Office Department has ordered an innova-
tion in the postal service by the experi-
mental establishment of a "post office on
wheels," to operate in the vicinity of
Westminster, Maryland. The service,
which is to begin very shortly, calls for
the use of a postal wagon to travel over
the designated route in rural districts.
Mail boxes can be placed at some point on
the route for every farmer living within a
mile or two from the proposed route, and
mail will be collected therefrom. One
important feature of the contemplated
innovation which, if successful, will be
extended generally, is that it will have
money order and registered matter facili-
ties.
