Following are the resolutions approved at the teachers convention concluded Wednesday at O'Leary.

Resolved that the thanks of the convention be extended to the O'Leary School Board for the use of the High School for the convention. Also resolved that thanks be extended to the President, Mr. Robert Grindlay, Miss Estelle Bowness, Dr. L. W. Shaw, Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, Miss Marie Bowness, Miss Mona Clay, Miss Helen Yeo and all others who contributed in any way to a very profitable and instructive convention, not forgetting Mrs. Blanche Crockett who so willingly took over secretarial duties in the absence of Mrs. Dunn.

Whereas the appointment of a select standing committee on education last March was largely due to the efforts of the Board of Governors of the P.E.I. Teachers Convention and in particular to its executive, resolved that this convention extend a vote of thanks to the board and executive for the forward step in the interests of the profession.

Whereas the select standing committee on education made specific recommendations for surmounting the crisis in education, said to exist in this Province, and whereas it would appear that little has been done to implement those recommendations, resolved that the executive of the P.E.I.T.F. press for a committee to continue functioning in the house until the education needs of the Province are filled.

Whereas many teachers have used the present language series for grades 4, 5, and 6, and have found them unsatisfactory while others have used the series "Language Journeys" and find them very satisfactory, be it resolved that the present series be replaced by Language Journeys.

Whereas the teachers are responsible for the behaviour of the pupils coming to and going from school, be it resolved that the teachers be relieved of the said responsibility and that the responsibility be invested in the parents and Board of Trustees.

Whereas there seems to be a great need for standardized tests for use in the different grades, resolved that these be made available to teachers requesting them.

Be it resolved that the Dept. of Education supply free to each school a copy of the "Canada Year Book".

## S'ide Trade Board Urges Immediate Sub-Grading Job

The initial fall and winter meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last evening in the Civic Building with the president, Mr. C.R. MacLaggan presiding.

The meeting approved a letter to the Minister of Highways, Hon. George MacKay, requesting that the remaining section of the Sherbrooke highway be sub-graded right away. Sub-grading has been completed between St. Eleanor's and Travellers Rest with the exception of one section east of the Central Street intersection and it is felt this highway should be completely sub-graded now so the entire road will be ready for paving in the spring.

Mr. Edgar Cannon reported that approximately 5,000 tourists registered at the Read's Corner Tourist Bureau although unfavorable conditions prevailed as the bureau was somewhat isolated due to roadwork being carried out in that area.

He also reported on the Lobster Carnival, stating that the profits were not nearly as high as last year, due mainly to horse racing, track and field meet and boat racing. He also recommended the return to a 4-day carnival for future years.

## Wreath, Poppy Committee Meets

The initial meeting of the wreath and poppy committee was held on Wednesday evening in the Summerside Legion Home.

Comrade Harold Harkness was appointed campaign chairman, with sub-chairman Robert Clark in charge of wreaths and Horace Hayes taking charge of poppy sales. Joe Clark was appointed publicity chairman.

## W. Prince Liberals Express Appreciation To Former MP

Mr. Arnold Wood of O'Leary was elected President of the West Prince Liberal Association at the annual meeting held in O'Leary Wednesday evening.

Mr. Lester B. Wallace, retiring President, occupied the chair. Other officers include secretary, Kenneth Matheson; vice-presidents for the First District - Harry MacWilliams, Wilfred Shear, G.R. Leard, and Russell Stewart; Second District vice - Harris Rogers, Burleigh.

Mr. Wood, who expressed his appreciation for the confidence placed in him in his election to the office of presidency, moved, during his acceptance speech, a resolution of appreciation to Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C., for his many years of service to Prince County and to the Liberal Party.

The following is the text of the resolution:

"Resolved that this meeting of the West Prince Liberal Association express appreciation for the outstanding representation we have had at Ottawa during the past twelve years, through the capable and unremitting efforts of the Liberal member, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C.

"His achievements have been exceedingly high, not only for West Prince, but for the County and Province generally.

"West Prince projects secured by him included boat harbors at Howard's Cove and Skinners Pond; rebuilt wharves and breakwaters at Tignish, Alberton, Miminegash and West Point; new public buildings at O'Leary, R.C.M.P. barracks at Alberton; new wharves at Brooks shore and Gordon's Point, reduction of truck rates on car ferry from \$65 to approximately \$6. Other general benefits secured were unemployment insurance for fishermen; government insurance plan for lobster traps and boats, and countless other benefits.

"It is therefore with pride and satisfaction that we order inscribed in the minutes of this meeting a record of the great accomplishments of Mr. J. Watson MacNaught as county representative."

The resolution was unanimously adopted as were also resolutions of confidence in Hon. Louis St. Laurent, national Liberal leader; Hon. Alex Matheson, Premier of Prince Edward Island; Hon. Forrest Phillips, Minister of Welfare; Messrs. Fred C. Ramsay, M.L.A., and Mr. P.A. Arsenault, M.L.A.

Resolutions were also adopted expressing loyalty to Her Majesty The Queen, appreciation to Senator Barbour, another urging unemployment insurance for farm help on a voluntary basis and also a resolution asking equalization of the tariff on potatoes between U.S.A. and Canada.

The meeting remained in session until midnight to hear speeches from Premier Matheson, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C., Messrs. Fred Ramsay and P.A. Arsenault, members for First Prince; Hon. George MacKay, Minister of Highways, Senator George Barbour, Hon. Earle MacDonald, provincial secretary
