New Roundup Of Hungarians

BUDAPEST (AP) — Informed sources here estimated Saturday that thousands of Hungarians—perhaps as many as 10,000—have been arrested in the latest roundup by Communist police.

The purpose of the new arrest wave is to crush suspected underground preparations for a new anti-Communist revolution similar to that of last October, according to a statement made Thursday by Minister of State Gyorgy Marosan.

Sources said those seized are men and women of all ages. Most of them have been sent directly to a statement made Thursday by Minister of State Gyorgy Marosan. 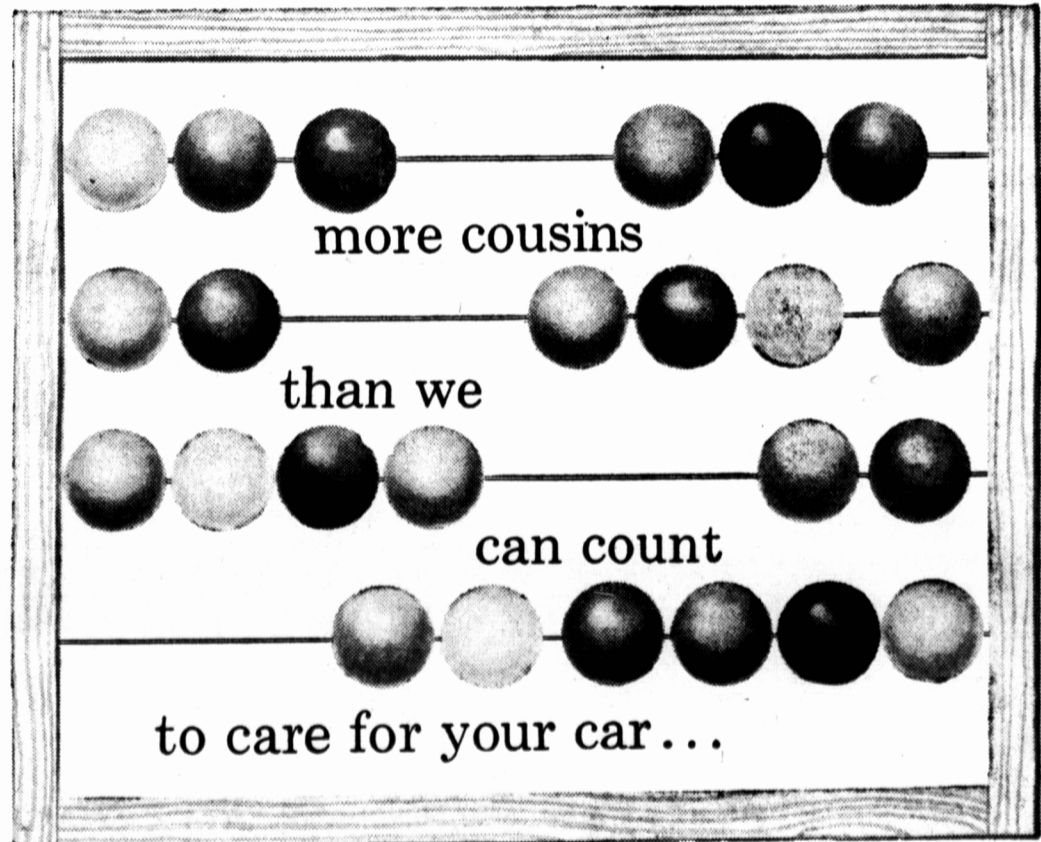
