DIED ABROAD.—News of the death of Mr. George Howatt, at St. Augustine Fla., yesterday morning has been received. Death was caused by erysipelas. Mr. Howatt was 58 years of age, and previous to leaving this province, some ten years ago, did business at Crapaud. The deceased leaves a wife and four children. He was a brother of Mr. Bradford D. Howatt of Crapaud, and of Mrs. Thomas Regerson, of the same place. Mrs. Dutcher and Mrs. William Burke, of Charlottetown, and Mr. Ryder, of Boston, are sisters. His mother resides at Crapaud. The bereaved widow and family and other relatives have the sympathy of a large circle of friends.

WHEAT ON BLOTTING PAPER.—Yesterday afternoon Mr. Geo. Carter showed THE EXAMINER a sheet of blotting paper upon which a snug bunch of wheat was growing. The wheat seed, which was taken from a lot recently received, was scattered between sheets of blotting paper on the 4th inst. These sheets were kept moist, and yesterday, when Mr. Carter examined them he found that the seed had taken root, piercing the blotting paper in every direction, while the blades of wheat had grown almost two inches. A seed that will thrive so on blotting paper should do well on any soil. The seed imported by Mr. Carter is always the best obtainable, and it is all carefully tested before being sold by him.

Bismarck's Escape.

LONDON, April 11.—The first issue of the Sunday edition of the Daily Mail contains a statement by Dr. Schwenger, for many years Prince Bismarck's physician, in which he relates the old Chancellor's thirty years' struggle with death. While hunting in August, 1897, he fell from his horse, experiencing thereafter a slight pain in his left leg. He visited a quack doctor at Heidelberg, who ordered the application of a plaster before proceeding on his journey home by train. The chief ingredient of the plaster was Spanish fly. The Prince awoke in the night in violent pain. He tore off the plaster and disclosed a deep wound which was perfectly black. A burning inflammation developed, and it was thought that amputation of the leg would be necessary. Special treatment caused temporary modifications of the pain, but it recurred frequently until his death. His physicians on several occasions told him he was within a hand's grasp of death.

Deceased was an early convert of the late Rev. D. McDonald and a very desirable woman, she leaves a brother and sister to mourn their irreparable loss. Age 78.

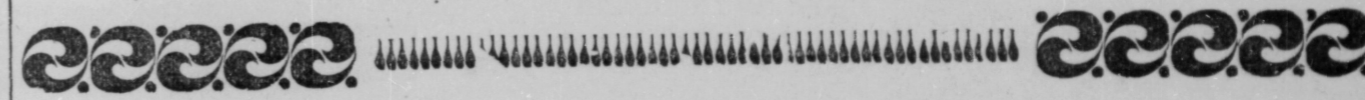
