BOLD BURGLARY.—The warehouse of Mr. Frank McKenna, in the rear of his place of business on Queen Street, was burglarized last night and eight or ten cases of Royal Blend whiskey taken therefrom. An entrance was effected by boring some forty or fifty holes with a bracing-bit in the door of the warehouse in the vicinity of the bolts, after a similar operation had been performed on the gate separating the yard in which the warehouse is located from the lane in the rear. The stolen goods were evidently taken away in a cart. The burglars were not strangers to the place and knew just where to bore for the bolts. The matter has been reported to the police. It is hoped the guilty persons will be brought to justice.

MEETING AT FOUR.—On the 14th, the ratepayers of Souris met in the Court-house, in response to a notice from James McQuaid, chairman of the Board of Fire Wardens or Assessors, viz. James McCormack, H. H. Acorn, James McEachern, Patrick St John, A. M. Currie, and voted that the Fire Wardens offer for sale debentures to the amount of \$2000.00 for 15 years at 4 per cent for the purpose of putting in three tanks and sinking wells and putting in forcepumps and also the buying of a fire hand engine and 500 feet of hose for protection against fire, which meeting asked that such protection be got as soon as possible and the Fire Wardens have now in hand the plans of tanks, and workmen will be at work next week on same.

A SING SUM.—A Boston banking house has in its keeping \$65,000 which it does not know what to do with. The money was raised by the Volunteer Aid Association, and was to be used in caring for wounded soldiers during the Spanish war. The wounded men are now nearly all dead or well, and as the bankers have no authority to use the \$65,000 to alleviate the sufferings of the troops in the Philippines, the money is lying idle. It is probable that the interest on this fund will eventually be turned over to some hospital.
