New Year's Greetings
From Group Capt. Kenyon

The following statement express-
ing New Year's greetings to the
people of the community has been
received from Group Captain A. G.
Kenyon, C.D., commanding officer
of R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside:
To obtain some perspective in
looking forward into 1953 a brief
review of the past will be useful
and in this case a look at some of
the more distant past might be of
interest.

R.C.A.F. station, Summerside,
became active more than ten years
ago as a wartime flying training
school, one of the many aircraft
schools opened about that time as
part of the British Commonwealth
Air Training Plan.
Because the station is located
near a large body of water it was
an ideal location for a general re-
naissance school and its func-
tion was changed to this role with-
in a reasonable short space of time.

At the end of the war it was
closed down in common with many
other war time stations, and a few
years later re-activated, though not
on a very large scale until the
"cold war" got quite warm. Since
then the station has operated at a
reasonable, constant level.

1953 Welcomed

At Summerside

The New Year 1953 at Sum-
merside was welcomed in by hundreds
of people who assembled at public
and private parties on New Year's
eve.

New Years morning dawned clear
and sunny and the day, with its
moderating temperature, provided
ideal weather, permitting a maxi-
mum of travel and visitation. It
also provided a few hundred skat-
ing enthusiasts with their first
skate of the season.

Throughout the afternoon Chief
Justice and Mrs. T. A. Campbell
with their two sons and daughter,
and Mayor and Mrs. Henry W.
Wedge with their son and daugh-
ter, received many friends at their
respective homes.

It was also the occasion for many
Summerside citizens to visit among

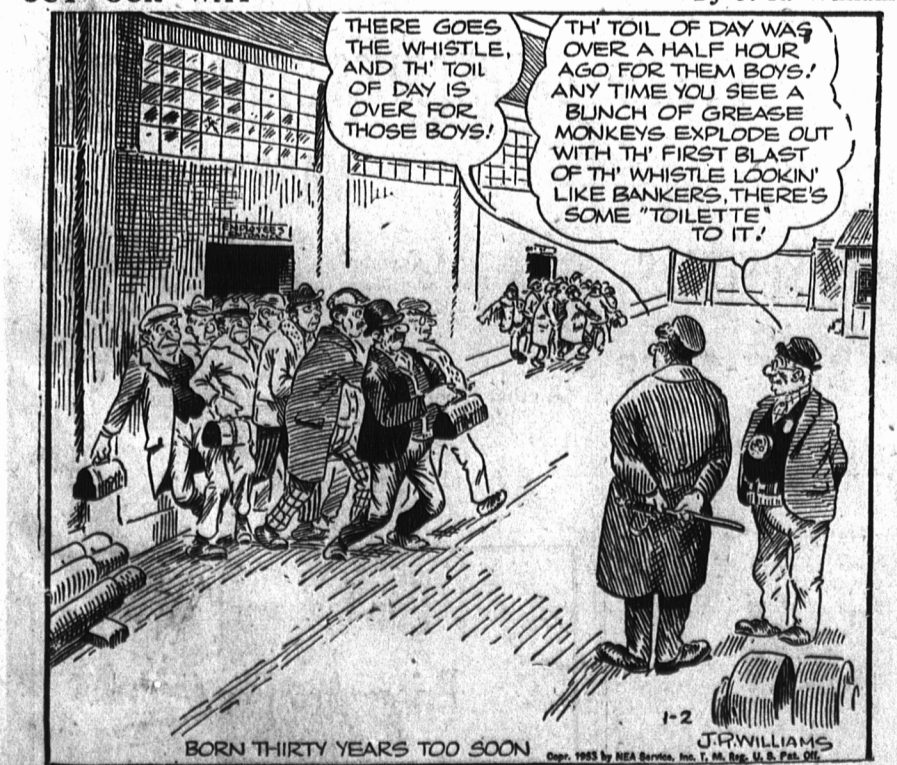
