

# Long Hitters Have Edge In Canadian Open In B.C.

VANCOUVER (CP) — Power and distance of the tee will be a decided advantage in this week's Canadian open golf tournament at Shaughnessy Golf and Country Club.

The golfer with the long ball off the tee will definitely have a big edge," says Fred Wood, 1957 N.S. National Seniors' Open champion and professional of the host club.

Wood favors Jack Nicklaus to win the four-day Open which starts Thursday, but he doesn't overlook Billy Casper, top money winner on the PGA circuit so far this year.

The Vancouver pro said some of the touring professionals have told him the fairways are too long for the average Sunday golfer, but Wood says the weather and humidity have made them appear longer than they actually are.

"Because of the humidity, the golfers are not getting the distance in the air and the damp grass slows the ball after it hits," Casper is one of the pros critical of the 6,907-yard, par 71 layout.

**DISLIKES COURSE**  
"The greens are too small for the lengths of the holes. This means that there is a very small target to shoot at. If you miss there is a tough shot left."

"I also think a few of the bunkers could be eliminated. They are so far away from the greens they aren't even in play for the pros and the course is tough enough without them for the members."

The Open is preceded today by a Pro-Am tournament featuring several personalities including Bing Crosby, Jim Bacus and Rod Sterling.

Gene Littler of Las Vegas, the defending champion, did not agree that the big hitters would have the advantage.

"I don't think you can really say any course is suited to any particular golfer," said Littler, known more for his precise putting and approach shots.

"If a man is playing well, he will play any course well. And if he isn't playing well, it doesn't make any difference what course he's on."

He also disagreed with Casper that the greens are too small. "The greens are a nice size. It's just that there are so many footprints in them... they're soft and wet and slow."

Among the pros to take advantage of the practice session were Nicklaus and Canadians George Knudson and Stan Leonard. Knudson, Canada's top pro at 29, worked out almost unnoticed on the practice fairway.

Leonard of Vancouver toured the course in the company of other pros. Knudson is from Toronto.

But it was the colorful Juan

Chi Chi Rodriguez who stole the show from his colleagues. He carried on a running monologue with about 100 fans who saw him off on the first hole. By the time he had completed half the circuit his following swelled to about 800.

**SINGS AND JOKES**  
He treated them to a medley of songs, jokes and trick shots including a drive down the 16th fairway from a kneeling position. The ball was only about 30 yards short of his original drive.

PGA officials said three of the top pros have cancelled out. They include Phil Rodgers of La Jolla, Calif., Mike Souchak of Durham, N.C., and Dave Hill of Evergreen, Colo.

Hill will be replaced by Bob Cox of Bellingham, Wash.; Souchak by Alec Cotton of Vancouver and Rodgers by Bill Wakeham of Victoria.

Cox, Cotton and Wakeham just missed the 76 passing mark in Monday's qualifying round, each shooting 77s.

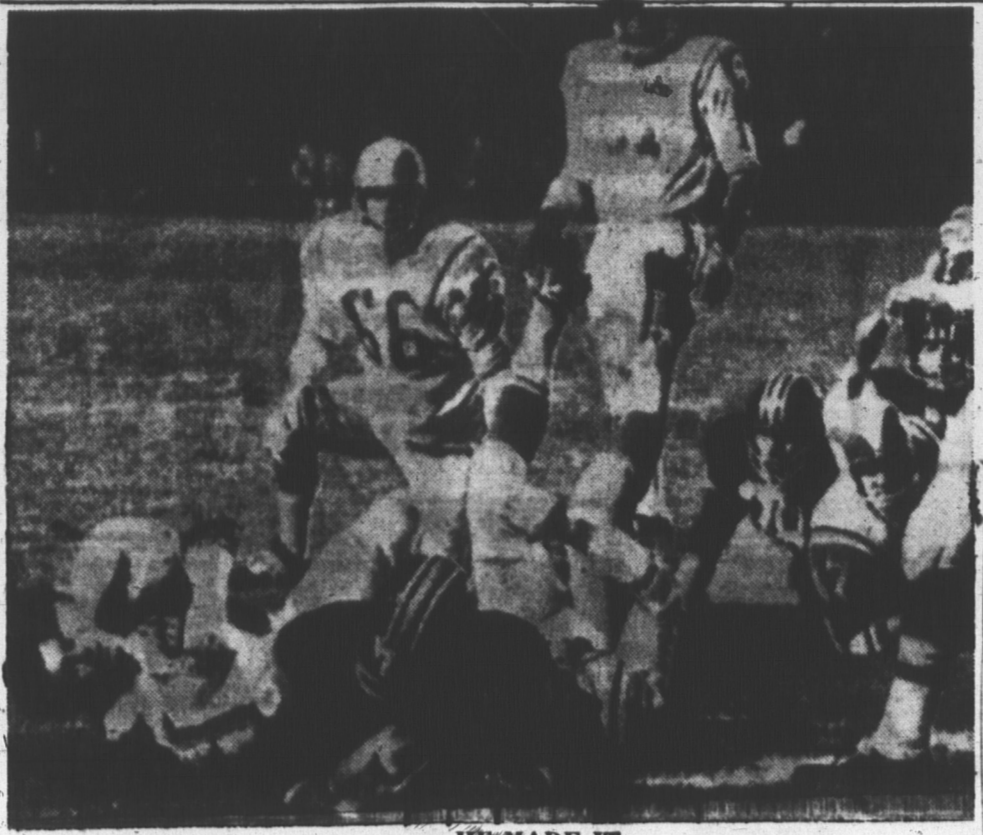

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Harmon Killebrew hit his 37th home run and Jim Perry pitched a three-hitter as Minnesota Twins defeated Cleveland Indians 5-1 Tuesday.

Zoilo Versalles also starred for the Twins with a two-run double in the second of losing pitcher Gary Bell.

Versalles also scored Minnesota's third run in the fifth. Killebrew slammed his homer with none on in the sixth. Rookie Vern Fuller's third-inning homer accounted for the only run off Perry, who recorded his 10th victory against seven losses.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Los Angeles Dodgers continued their surge toward the National League pennant Tuesday night by defeating St. Louis Cardinals 2-0 behind the four-hit pitching of Don Drysdale.

The victory increased the Dodgers' margin over second-place Pittsburgh Pirates to three games with five remaining and reduced the Dodgers' magic number to three.

Any combination of Dodger victories and Pirate losses totaling three will bring the Dodgers their second, consecutive pennant.
