French Politics.

It is announced that the Government of France have decided upon a programme the main features of which are: Maintenance in its integrity of the bill on superior education; reduction of taxation and declaration that the conversion of five per cent. rentes is inopportune.

Proposed Canadian Exposition in Brazil.

The Journal de Comercio, a leading commercial journal of Rio Janeiro, in referring to the proposed exhibition of manufacturers and producers of the Dominion in that city, says in its issue of Aug 3rd: "Some manufacturers and producers of the Dominion of Canada are projecting an exposition of the natural and artificial products of that country to be held in this city in July and October of 1880, hoping to be aided in the realization of this project by the Canadian Government which will have to ask pecuniary aid of Parliament."

The West India Trade.

Few people have any idea of the rapidity with which the National Policy is restoring to us the direct trade of the West Indies, completely cut off by the policy of the late Government. Since the opening of navigation forty-five vessels, with a tonnage of twenty thousand seven hundred tons, have arrived at the port of Montreal from the West Indies with cargoes of sugar and molasses, against seven vessels, with a tonnage of twelve hundred tons, in 1878, and three vessels, with a tonnage of seven hundred tons, in 1877.

Drill in Schools.

The following are the regulations made by the Militia Department in regard to military drill in schools:—If a university, college or school has adopted a special uniform to be worn by all students attending such university, college or school, such uniform, if suitable for military parades and exercises, will be accepted as the uniform of the company.

A Yorkshire trainer lately revealed his method of meeting a conjugal storm. His plan, he said, was to keep silent and not his acquiescence to everything—no matter what—said by his spouse.

The Prince Imperial's Will.

The Illustrated London News states that the will (dated Feb. 26, 1879) of his Imperial Highness Napoleon Eugene Louis Jean Joseph, Prince Imperial formerly of the Palace of the Tuileries, Paris, but late of Camden-place, Chisellhurst, who died on June 1, at Ilyotoyzi River, South Africa, was proved in London on the 20th ult., by Eugene Rouher and Jean Baptiste Franceschini Pietri, the executors, the personal estate being sworn under £60,000.

Stocks in New York.

The stock speculation craze continued on Tuesday last, with dealings aggregating 491,050 shares, and an advance in prices ranging from 1/2 to 6 per cent. The stocks which advanced most were Erie, Western Union Telegraph, Kansas Pacific, Union Pacific and the coal stocks.

The Gold Drain from Europe.

The London Daily News, in its financial article of Tuesday, says:—"A considerable quantity of American bills was offered in market yesterday, presumably to cover an early payment for iron already shipped. If gold continues to leave England and France to the same extent as it has lately done, it will soon become necessary to consider the possibility of a measure to stop the outflow."

ACCORDING to a very absurd order recently issued by the American post office department every address of a letter must give the name of the State, or the abbreviation commonly in use therefor, or the letter will not be delivered. Hereafter it will not do to address American correspondence simply to "New York," "Boston" or "Philadelphia," the reason given being that the names of the large cities are sometimes also given to smaller places, for which the letters may possibly be intended.

An eight day's retreat is now in progress at St. Dunstan's Cathedral. It is attended by the Catholic population of this city, who will, doubtless, be greatly benefited by the instructions received during the services. Mass is celebrated at seven o'clock each morning, and a benediction is given at seven o'clock in the evening.

BIG POTATO.—We were shown to-day, by John Brecken, Esq., a large potato, of the McIntyre variety, raised by Charles Hyndman, Esq., Brighton. It weighs 2 1/2 lbs; its girth being 11 inches, and round its length it measured 2 1/4 inches. It was raised, we are informed, on land manured with gypsum.

At four o'clock this evening a little boy named Murphy was seriously injured by being run over by a horse—attached to a cart—which took fright and ran away from Hyndman's corner. A little boy named Batt was also seriously injured by being run over on Great George Street yesterday.
