

LITTLE SANDS

The week of May 6 to 11, was a wonderful, warm, sunny and calm week for the fishermen, and many traps were put out. But there are a considerable number of traps still to be put out. The arrival of the bait schooner, with Capt. Royal White of Murray Harbour from the Magdalene Islands, which arrived at Wood Islands on May 9, delayed the fishermen somewhat also some put traps out without any bait. Capt. White made all haste possible after the herring struck at the Magdalene Islands to get bait as quickly as possible to the waiting fishermen. There were many trucks in line at Wood Island, hours before the schooner arrived waiting for the bait and Thursday and Friday, May 9 and

10th, were busy days as fishermen gathered from many surrounding districts for their share of the precious bait. It is believed there are a considerable number of traps to be put out, and lobsters are reported very scarce along the shore and on the bank to Pinette.

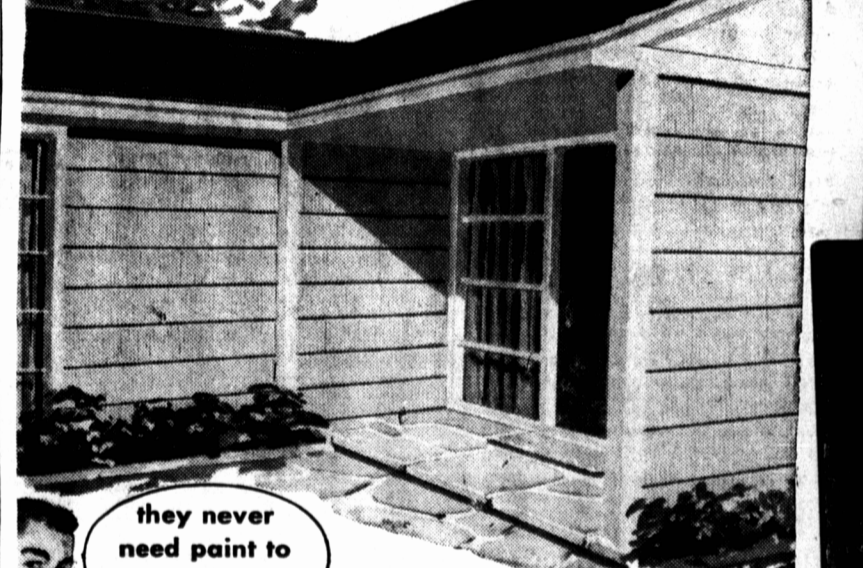
