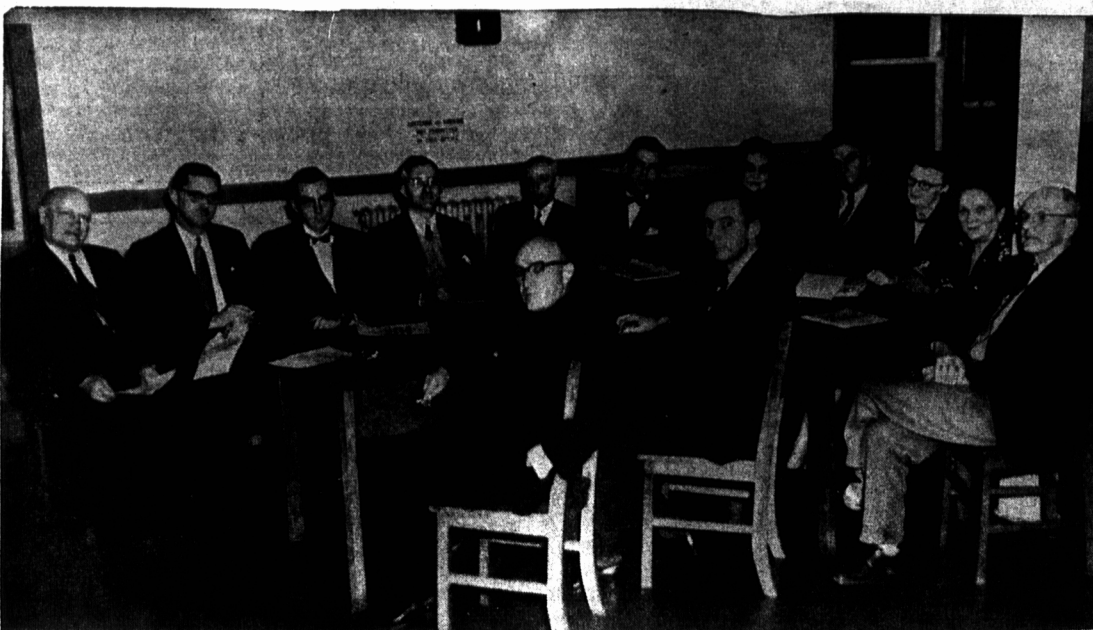

Jobs Campaign Discussed By Employment Group

A full scale discussion on seasonal unemployment took place last night when the Local Employment Advisory Committee of the Charlottetown National Employment Office met to discuss the Jobs Campaign which is to be undertaken about January 10th.

In addition to the members of the Employment Committee, representatives from the Charlottetown City Council, the Charlottetown Board of Trade, the Kinsmen Club and the Lions Club were present.

Mr. Charles Boylan, a member of the Local Employment Advisory Committee, also a member of the South Branch of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, suggested that a trades school be established for the training of fileters. He informed the meeting that approximately \$80,000 a year was leaving the Province in wages paid to mainland workers who came here for the working season, only. After the season was over, these men left for their homes in Cape Breton and New Brunswick. Sometimes, Mr. Boylan explained, these men left in mid-season and the fish packing plant in Souris was very often in difficult straits because of their departure.

Some of the facts given by Mr. Boylan about the progress of the fishing industry in Souris, started the meeting, and many of them learned for the first time of the tremendous strides which are being made in the eastern town, as a growing fishing centre. Mr. Boylan also said that although all of the druggers had fish-finding facilities, somewhat similar to radar, that very few boats are able to use them because no trained men were available, who could operate the machines. There was, said Mr. Boylan, the need of training facilities, so that the druggers could take full advantage of the fish finding apparatus with which each boat was equipped.

A committee was named to wait on the Provincial Department of Fisheries to find out what could be done to train fileters, and to train men in the operation of fish-finding equipment.

Mr. Rogers manager of the Bank of Montreal, who represented the Board of Trade, informed the meeting that the Board was preparing for a panel discussion on seasonal unemployment for the evening of January 11 which would be broadcast. Mr. Rogers said that the Board of Trade would lend every assistance to the Jobs Campaign.

Mr. MacDonald made the suggestion that in view of the growing importance of the fishing industry, that a panel discussion should be arranged by people prominent in the fishing activities. Mr. MacDonald thought this very desirable in view of the fact that the Government was to be approached about the establishing of a trade school for fileters. A Committee was appointed to wait on the Minister of Fisheries, Mr. Douglas MacKinnon, to inquire what could be done about the establishing of a trade school to help the fishing industry. The Committee will be composed of Mr. Charles Boylan of Souris, and Councillor Arthur Wright of Charlottetown.

Minister Of Labor Reviews Employment Outlook For '56

OTTAWA (CP)—Labor Minister Gregg said today Canada's employment outlook for 1956 "has many elements of strength."

Agricultural income is down but most other primary industries show few signs of weakness, the minister said in a year-end review. There was every reason to believe that employment among the country's 5,500,000-man labor force would be higher this winter than last.

"This does not mean that there will be no seasonal unemployment," he said. "This winter, as in every winter in the past, we are having a decline in employment during the cold months."

It is not likely that seasonal unemployment can ever be entirely eliminated in our cold northern climate. However, during the past year a concentrated effort has begun, aimed at reducing seasonal unemployment in this country—an effort in which employer groups, organized labor and governments at all levels are co-operating.

EXPRESS CONFIDENCE—In simultaneous year-end messages, the leaders of Canada's two largest labor bodies, Claude Jodoin, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, and A.R. Mosher, president of the Canadian Congress of Labor, expressed confidence in the future.

The two labor leaders saw increased strength for Canadian labor through the merger next April of the 400,000-member CCL and the 600,000-member T.L.C. The new Canadian Labor Congress will be headed by Mr. Jodoin.

Mr. Gregg said that although unemployment reached a post-war high early in 1955, employment grew steadily through the year and by mid-summer equalled the post-war peak of 1953.

Employment decreased on farms and in coal mining, shipbuilding and aircraft manufacturing industries. But in most other industries it increased.

1,615 Athletes Invade Italy

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP)—A total of 1,615 athletes and officials will invade Cortina d'Ampezzo and nearby Misurina for the 1956 Olympic Games, organizers said Tuesday.

Of them, 155 will participate in the speed skating events and the others in the remaining competitions.

Iron Curtain countries will send 391 persons, plus the East-German members of the Joint German team.

The Soviet Union will have the largest of the 31 squads with 145 participants. The United States follows with 126 and Sweden with 113.

The strong Scandinavian group—Sweden, Finland and Norway—forms a bloc of 286 entrants. Denmark is not participating.

The smallest group is formed by three Bolivians. Greece follows with five, Iran with six and Liechtenstein with seven.

First to arrive will be the Iranians, Jan. 10. The Polish team will arrive in separate contingents, starting Jan. 11.

Resolution On Fluoridation By High School Association

The following resolution, urging fluoridation for the City water supply, without delay, has been forwarded to the City Water Commissioners from the Queen Charlotte High School Home and School Association:

"Whereas these studies have also shown that the beneficial effects of fluoridation extend into adult life, and

"Whereas the Charlottetown City Council has already recommended to the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply that they proceed with fluoridation, and

"Whereas the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply are the properly elected representatives of the citizens of Charlottetown, to look after their best interests in matters pertaining to the City water supply, therefore be it

"Resolved that the Queen Charlotte High School Home and School Association reaffirms to the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply its recommendation, previously presented to the Charlottetown City Council, that fluoridation of the City water be introduced without further delay."

Travelogue By Mrs. Rogers Attracts Large Audience

Rogers, who last summer toured France, Italy, and Switzerland finishing with a trip through the British Isles. Using coloured slides to accentuate a vivid description of her trip, Mrs. Rogers thrilled her audience with accounts of the places she visited.

Six Nfld. Men Snatched From Grip Of Ice Pack

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Six men were whisked from the clutches of a hungry ice pack off Newfoundland's west coast Sunday after the ship capsized.

Jagged ice pierced the hull of the motor vessel Young Harp as she butted her way through the Bay of Islands with a cargo of oil for ports between Corner Brook and Flowers Cove.

Capt. William James of Sedgee's Quay said his vessel filled with water in 20 minutes and rolled over on her side. The oil barrels she carried on her decks spilled into the sea.

Capt. James and his five-man crew were picked up by the ice-breaker Finback which rushed to the scene in answer to a distress call. They were landed in Corner Brook.

The motor vessel Dunback also answered the call and put a line aboard the Young Harp but that towline later had to be released.
