INVALIDED SOLDIERS ARRIVE AT QUEBEC

Were Given an Enthusiastic Reception

WILL BE PAID OFF TO-DAY AND DISCHARGED.

Islanders May be Expected Home To-morrow Night.

QUEBEC, Sept. 24.—A detachment of fifty invalided soldiers of the first and second Canadian Contingents, arrived by steamer Dominion yesterday morning, and met with a most enthusiastic reception. They are quartered at the Citadel and will be paid off today and granted discharge.

Among the men are Privates A J Holl, Jas. S Walker, J Pigott and W Lane, of P. E. Island.

Death of Marshal Campos

MADRID, Sept. 24.—Marshal Arsenio Martin de Campos, died this morning shortly after 10 o'clock at Zarauz, near San Sebastian.

Reports From South Africa.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—The war office gave out the following despatch from Lord Roberts last evening: "Waterbouver, Sept 20—Pole-Carew reached Koomuidan yesterday. Practically there was no road, and a way had to be cut through jungles intersected by ravines. He captured 38 cars of flour, one car of coffee and 19 damaged engines."

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Further reports from Lord Roberts say the Boers who remain in the field include a few irreconcilables, but the majority are fighting under compulsion. General Delary, it is added, holds three hundred burghers as prisoners in his laager.

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 23.—In the Cape house of assembly yesterday the treason bill was passed to a third reading by a vote of 46 against 37.

THE GENERAL'S VISIT.

Church Parade Yesterday.—Inspection of Engineers to day.

Major-General O'Grady-Haley, accompanied by his aide-de-camp, Captain Fleming, arrived in Charlottetown from Ottawa on Saturday night.

Yesterday morning a military parade to St. Paul's Church was held, composed of No's 1 and 3 Co's, 82nd Regiment. Gen. O'Grady Haley was present. After service, conducted by Rev. Leo Williams, the troops marched to the Drill Shed where the Artillery, Engineers and 4th Regiment, C A, band were inspected by the General. He expressed pleasure at the turnout and the appearance of the men.

This afternoon General O'Grady Haley is inspecting the Charlottetown Engineers. Infantry drill began about one o'clock. At 2.30 inspection in military engineering was commenced. A ponoon and trestle bridge was thrown across Government Pond.

ELECTRICAL STORM IN NOVA SCOTIA

Fires Started in Several Places

TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE WIRES INTERRUPTED

Havoc Played With Electric Light Transformers.

HALIFAX, Sept 24.—An electrical storm of unusual duration came on with tropical suddenness on Saturday night shortly after six o'clock and lasted until midnight accompanied by a perfect downpour of rain.

The storm was general throughout the province, and played havoc with fish boxes and electric light transformers, paralyzing telephone system in sections and leaving some sections of the town in darkness.

Telegraphs worked in an uncertain manner. Thunder broke and rumbled for six hours in an ominous fashion.

The lightning struck numerous places, starting fires, some of which did considerable damage.

CONCERNING BAKING POWDERS.

Report of the Inland Revenue Department—Large Quantities of Impure Powders Found—Sale of Alum Powders Forbidden.

The Bulletin of the Inland Revenue Department (No. 63) contains analyses of 156 samples of baking powders bought of dealers and manufacturers in the Dominion. The alarming statement is made that 85 per cent. of these are alum mixtures.

In view of this large proportion of alum powders, Chief Analyst Macfarlane recommends that legal proceedings be taken against parties selling them, on the ground that they are unwholesome articles of food.

Upon this recommendation the Commissioner of Inland Revenue has given public notice that persons selling alum powders will be prosecuted.

The analysis was made by the Assistant Analyst, Mr. A. McGill, who fully discusses the use of alum in baking powders, which, he is of the positive opinion, is dangerous to health.

Professor Rattan, of McGill College, Montreal, who made a series of experiments on the digestibility of bread baked with alum powders, is quoted as follows: "The unanimous verdict of my experiments is that alum powders introduce into a form of food of universal use, agents which are detrimental to the functional activity of the digestive ferment. They must therefore be prejudicial to health, and the only course is to carefully avoid them."

Both consumers and grocers are interested in this matter. Housekeepers should be very careful in purchasing their baking powders. The alum powders can generally be distinguished by their low price. They cost but two or three cents a pound to make, and are sold from ten to thirty cents. A pure, cream of tartar powder, is quite expensive to make, and is sold from forty to fifty cents.

MEETING OF THE FEDERAL CABINET

Dissolution Has Been Agreed Upon.

BUT THE DATE OF THE ELECTION IS NOT FIXED

Probably First Week in November or Last Week in October.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.—The Cabinet meeting on Saturday for the fifth time formally tackled the question of the dissolution of parliament.

The meeting followed a lengthy session of the Treasury Board at which, it is understood, several retirements from the public service were passed and a number of appointments made.

Dissolution has been agreed upon, but the date of nomination and holding of election has not been fixed as it was thought desirable to wait a few days to see what progress will be made by the Printing Bureau in getting out the voters lists and requisite forms.

The election will take place, it is said by good authority, either the last week of October or the first week of November.

Twenty-eight days will suffice for the day of dissolution until the polling by adopting the device of notifying the returning officers by telegraph to get out the proclamations without waiting for the arrival of election writs.
