IMPROVED GARAGE.—The Charlottetown Garage Company, who have taken over the business formerly operated by the late Ernest Rice on Prince St. are starting the New Year with an enlarged plant and a number of notable improvements. A large addition has been built to the rear of the garage and a new battery room 28x16 for the storing and repairing of batteries has been fitted up. At the east end the large room 28x50 formerly used for storing cars has been converted into a workshop and a concrete basin 16x28 has been built therein. The equipment, which is thoroughly up to date includes an overhead track and trolley of modern type with lifting capacity of two and one-half tons. By means of this an engine can be removed from the car and the rear end of the car itself raised. An elevator has been installed for carrying the batteries up to the battery room. The large section of the building used for storing cars will have the floors built up and levelled. Mr. Gordon Tomlin is manager of the Company and is in charge of the Garage.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 5.—Representative United States airmen met today to aid in formulating aerial traffic laws for New York. Airplanes flying over the city are becoming so numerous that the Board of Aldermen has decided that laws governing the aerial traffic were necessary. Organization of a special force of aerial traffic cops will probably be the next step.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—R. G. Dunn and Company's record of failures for 1920, made public today, showed 8,381 commercial failures throughout the United States, with \$295,121,805 in indebtedness against 6,451 failures in 1919 involving liabilities of \$113,291,237. The increase of 2,340 in number of commercial insolvencies last year as compared with those of 1919 is relatively much smaller than the expansion of \$181,800,000 in liabilities, showing the rise in number of failures and of indebtedness 37.7 per cent, and of indebtedness 160.5 per cent, the report said. After four successive years of diminishing commercial mortality, the continued business reverses of 1920 increased sharply. This was said to be "not unusual in a period marked by general economic readjustments."

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TO BE ORDAINED.—On Sunday Jan. 9th at High Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. His Lordship Bishop O'Leary will raise to the dignity of the Holy priesthood James Rooney, son of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Rooney, of Cherry Valley. This will be the third member of this family in the ranks of the priesthood, the others being Rev. Joseph, formerly of St. Dunstan's University and now the esteemed pastor of Morell parish; Rev. Alphonse in Helena, Montana, while another brother Eugene is studying in the Seminary at Quebec.

FOX MET DEATH ON RAIL.—A valuable "find" was made by one of the Railway repair men lately while working on the track near St. Dunstan's in the shape of a black fox, killed by the train evidently only a few hours before, for the body was quite warm. The fox was lying crouched between the wide and narrow gauge rails. The wheels of the train just nipped the nose and ear of the animal killing him, but leaving the body untouched. The fox was a handsome one, probably escaped from some near by ranch, though its ownership is yet unknown. The discovery was reported at once to the Railway authorities.
