## Steel Sales To Auto Firms Slow

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel magazine says no major automotive order for steel has been placed for a month, and the steel industry is not expecting much help from that source in March.

Auto makers are holding steel stocks to an abnormally low level of 20 days, the weekly journal of metalworking says. But sales of 1958 models have been 22.4 per cent under new model sales a year ago, and Feb. 1 new-car inventory was 21 per cent above a year ago.

Even with reduced production, the auto makers are expected to turn out about 1,700,000 cars in the Feb. 1-June 1 period. Deducing probable sales for the four months, that would leave nearly 900,000 cars in dealers' showrooms June 1, Steel says.

This meant that in event of a strike production could halt for six weeks "without inconveniencing buyers."  
Last week steel operations declined to 53.5 per cent of capacity, down a half point.

## Whaling Future Depends On Vote

GRAND BAY, Nfld. (CP)—The future of whaling operations in the Pacific out of Vancouver hinges on a vote being taken among British Columbia and Newfoundland whalers.

Last fall at the conclusion of the hunt the men presented the operators with a new working agreement that included a considerable increase in salaries, bonuses and rates for each whale caught.

The operators have declined to sign the agreement, it is reported here, and advised the men they will operate only on the terms of the 1957 agreement.

The men have put the matter to a vote. At a meeting here this week 80 per cent of the Newfoundland fishermen voted to operate on last year's agreement.

Decision of the West Coast fishermen will be made known Monday.

Between 20 and 30 Newfoundland fishermen voted. Involved in the dispute are British Columbia Packers Ltd. and the United Fishermen and Allied Workers' Union.

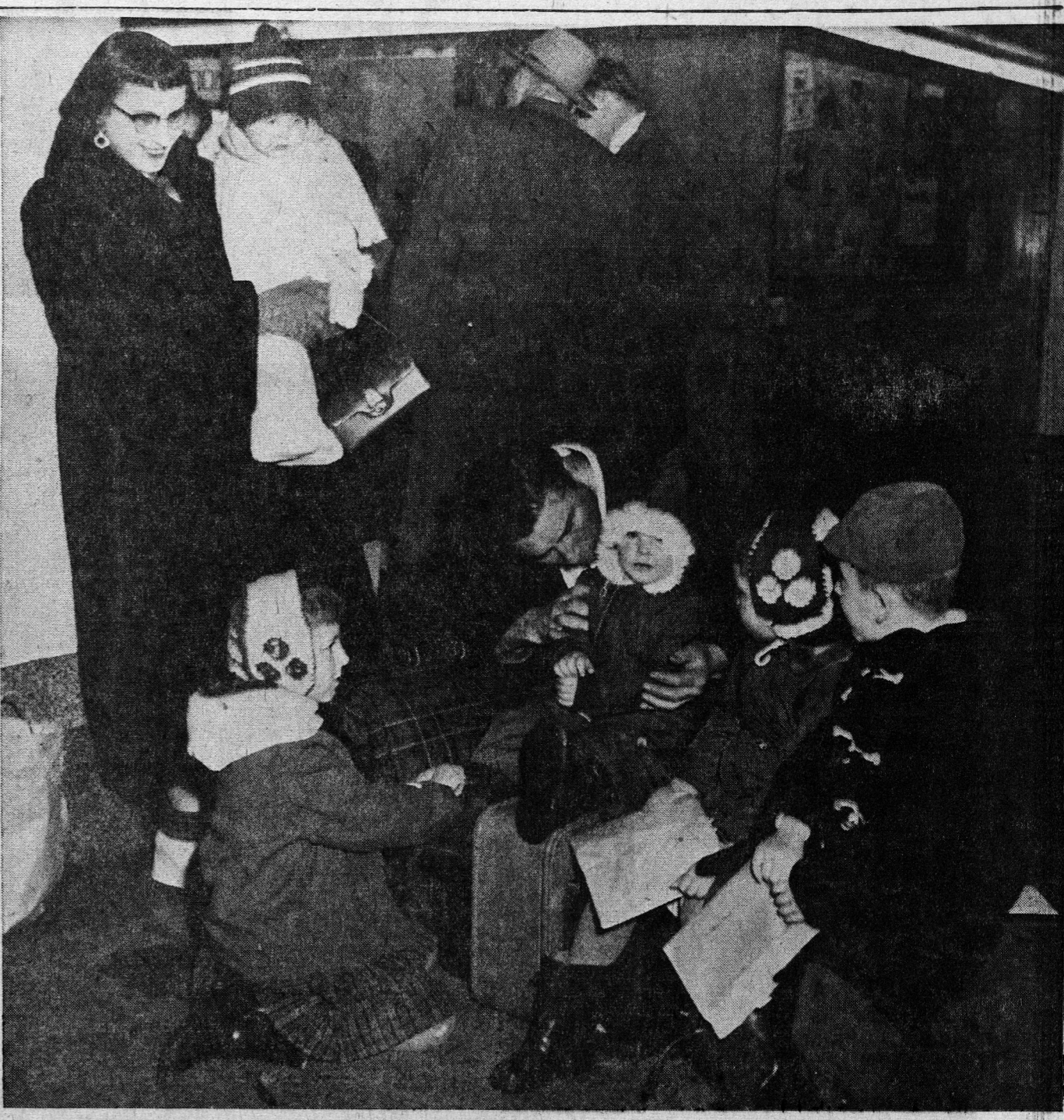

## Salmon Population Decline Presents Difficult Problems

Research and management programmes aimed at rehabilitating the stocks of Atlantic salmon in Canada's east coast were outlined at the annual meeting of the federal-provincial Atlantic Salmon Co-ordinating Committee which opened in Ottawa.

Hon. J. Angus MacLean, Minister of Fisheries, welcomed members of the Committee which is composed of Deputy Minister of Fisheries George R. Clark and provincial deputy ministers concerned with salmon in the five Atlantic provinces. Mr. Clark is acting as chairman of the two-day meeting.

Mr. MacLean paid tribute to the work of the Co-ordinating Committee and its advisory body, which is made up of representatives of provincial government departments and commercial and sport fishing organizations.

The Minister said that the services rendered by these people and the scientists and others engaged in the work of conserving Canada's natural resources was not generally appreciated by the public despite the magnitude of their contribution.

"Problems involved in efforts not only to halt the decline but to increase the Atlantic salmon populations were particularly complex because of the marked susceptibility of this species to even the slightest changes in its freshwater environment," Mr. MacLean said. Frequently these changes were so subtle as not to be noticeable to the untrained eye but their effects were nonetheless drastic.

The Minister cited the case of several European countries which had at one time enjoyed large populations of salmon but had seen them become seriously depleted. Much of this depletion was attributable to the impact of spreading civilization on the inland waterways in which the salmon are hatched and nurtured in the years until they go to sea.

## U. S. Gov't Admits Accidental Nuclear Explosion Possible

WASHINGTON (AP)—A U.S. government statement Friday conceded that an accidental crash involving a nuclear weapon could cause a poisonous dust cloud. But it said the dust would be harmless unless inhaled.

In a joint announcement apparently designed to quiet concern, the defence department and the Atomic Energy Commission said that planes, trains and trucks have been carrying nuclear weapons for 12 years, that there have been few accidents and that none has caused a nuclear explosion.

How many accidents have occurred, and where, the two agencies still declined to say, despite published reports that there have been several such ticklish incidents in recent years.

The statement defined a nuclear explosion as one involving "fission or fusion reaction creating a large explosive effect." No such reaction has occurred in any of the accidents, it was stressed.

ORDINARY EXPLOSIVES  
But, said the agencies, some nuclear weapons contain some ordinary chemical explosives—apparently for purposes of pushing fission sections together swiftly to create the "critical mass" required for explosion or to contribute to pressure-produced heat required for fusion.
