A By-law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1896.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:— 1st. A discount at the rate of Two and One-half Per Cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1896, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property for civic purposes.

A By-law for levying and specifying the rate of assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes under Statute 51 Victoria, Chapter 12.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:— 1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1896, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1896, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them on the eleventh day of April, A. D. 1896.

A By-law for levying and specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for a Waterworks Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:— 1st. The rate of Assessment on Real Estate for a Waterworks Fund under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1896, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1896, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them on the eleventh day of April, A. D. 1896.

A By-law in Addition to the Present By-law for Sanitary Purposes, for the Purpose of More Effectually Enforcing Cleanliness in the City.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:— 1st. That upon the refusal or neglect of any owner or occupier of any house, premises, cellar, yard, field or other place in the said City to remove any dirt, manure, animal or vegetable substance, stagnant water, filth or refuse matter of any kind on and from such premises, cellar, yard, field or other place, the Sanitary Officer to remove the same, it he is hereby authorized and required to cause the same to be removed at the expense of the owner or occupier of such premises, cellar, yard, field or other place, and the Sanitary Officer shall forthwith certify to the Stipendiary Magistrate, a list of the names of the persons who are the owners or occupiers of such premises, cellar, yard, field or other place, and the Stipendiary Magistrate, after the enforcement of the penalty under the latter Law for Sanitary Purposes, Chapter XVII, shall be applicable for the recovery of the amount thereof.

Kites That Carry Men. Five huge kites were used at Christ-church Park, Ipswich, by Lieut Powell a short time ago to demonstrate the possibility of raising a man from the ground for reconnoitering purposes in time of war. A wicker car was attached to the kites and held the aeronauts. During the trial it was prevented from taking too high a flight by an anchor rope held from below and paid out from a windlass. An ascent of about 50 feet was successfully made by three persons separately. It only required the letting out of more rope to have extended this distance.

Candy for the Children. A delicious and harmless candy for the children is ice cream candy. This is flavored with ice cream, and may be cut into sticks or small pieces if preferred. Boil three cups of sugar, a quarter of a teaspoonful of cream of tartar and one-half cup of water together, but do not stir the syrup at all while boiling. Boil until when a little is dropped into cold water it is brittle. Turn on to a large, well buttered platter or a marble slab that has been oiled, and as it cools fold the edges towards the center. As soon as it can be handled pull it until it is white.

Recording Music. A Frenchman has brought out an invention long looked for by musicians; it is a recording piano. By means of a typewriting instrument attached to the keyboard, anything that is played can be recorded by the instrument. 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LADIES' AND GENTS' PAPER PIANO CASES. Also Instrument Cases Made of Ivory and Wood. "All manner of articles in place of wood have been used in the manufacture of pianos," says one of the greatest English piano makers. "Perhaps the most successful of these is paper, of which many pianos have been made. The Duke of Devonshire has one of the finest specimens of the paper piano, this being of French make, and decorated most ornately with pictures by French artists. The Duke gave 500 guineas for this, mainly, no doubt, on account of the ornamentation. I suppose you know that pianos for very hot and very cold climates—places all instruments for export, in fact—have to be specially made, and in this direction all manner of experiments have been tried. Among others, a sort of cellulose, one factor in which is actually common molasses, from which sugar is made, is employed, and a composition made from the chemical treatment of gutta-percha and leather pulp has been tried. Ivory pianos are, by no means uncommon, and the Emperor Comteess of Durbach has a magnificent grand piano of this material. Pianos of ivory are, I might say, made every year in numbers, but chiefly for Indian Princes and rich Spanish-Americans. Many pianos of solid silver have been made; indeed, one was only recently completed by a London firm for the Nizam of Hyderabad, and piano cases have at various times been made of bronze, a species of aluminum, glass, porcelain, and, in combination, mother-of-pearl!"
