Before this latter group commenced, Mr. Mugford gave an informative talk on the work which could be accomplished with the very simple instruments used by the children, and had each type of instrument demonstrated by the pupils. Directed by Frances Ranaghan, the children then played two selections which were entirely unrehearsed, but which proved to the audience that the use of the rhythm band instruments developed a sense of rhythm, regardless of the age of the child.
