**Haunted By Dreams Of Medical Treatment**

Dear Mary Haworth: Some time last spring I wrote you, asking advice on deep depression. If you replied, I know your answer was wise and thoughtful—but I never saw it, as I went to the hospital in May and read no papers there.

However, you really had answered me many times, before and since, in your advice to others, to read Body, Mind and Soul (Henry Holt) and investigate the possibility, outlined by Dr. E. M. Abrahamson, of emotional depression being due to hyperinsulinism.

How much suffering, expense and loss could be avoided, if only people would pursue this line of inquiry before trying other modes of treatment. If only I had heeded your advice! May I offer my experience—to help others?

About a year ago, under great financial strain, I began drinking much coffee, heavily sweetened, to clear my head and spur myself to longer harder hours of writing. Result: more depression, worsening symptoms. Suicide beckoned, but I made a desperate search for help.

I had simple surgery, blood transfusions, hormone therapy, sedatives, tonics. No improvement. A certain tranquilizer put me in lower spirits than ever. Finally psychiatry!

**SHOCK TREATMENTS**

A psychiatrist, after one brief interview—no physical or laboratory tests—told my scared husband that I must have electroshock treatments. He consented. I wasn't informed of this, and entered the hospital, I was told, for rest. There I was locked up and forced to submit.

Dazed with the first electroshock treatment and nearly inert—but with a strong will and constant silent prayer—I resolved to escape somehow. But you had to be docile, had to be a good actor; had to pretend optimism, had to
