District W. I. Convention

On Thursday afternoon, June 19th, the thirteen Institutes represented by approximately one hundred and twenty-five members from East, Central and West Royalty, South Milton, South Winsloe, Highfield, Harrington, Springvale, Brackley, Brackley Point, Spring Park and Parkdale were entertained by North Milton Women's Institute in Parkdale Hall.

Mrs. Robert Carter presided and the meeting opened by singing the Ode and repeating the Creed.

The address of welcome given by Mrs. Verner Coles of North Milton, was fittingly responded to by Mrs. Victor Hudson of Parkdale.

The minutes of the last District Convention and the Executive Meeting of 1952 were read and on motion approved. Encouraging reports were read from each of the Institutes and were adopted as a whole.

Spring Park ladies agreed to entertain the Convention in 1953 and the nominating committee brought in the following slate of officers: President, Mrs. Morrison; vice-president, Mrs. Austin Graham; secretary, Mrs. Gordon Rodd.

The resolutions committee presented the following resolutions:

Be it resolved that the free Dental Clinic is permitted by the Government to visit only those areas not adjacent to larger centres on the Island and whereas we feel

that there are families in these adjacent centres as equally in need of dental assistance as those in rural areas; be it resolved that we express to the Premier and the Dept. of Health our feelings that the children in localities adjacent to large centres be given the advantages of the free dental clinic.

Be it resolved that whereas, our children are our most valuable asset, and their training and education is of such supreme importance; and whereas teachers need a thoroughly adequate training in methods and classroom management as well as in academic subjects, and whereas with the widening horizons of adult education, particularly the rural teacher is called upon to lead in so many varied activities; be it resolved that the present requirements of one year's academic work and one year's normal training remain the standard for second class license. And be it further resolved that we institute members in convention assembled, lend our full support to this resolution.

Be it resolved that thanks be extended to North Milton Women's Institute for their gracious and delightful hospitality and to Parkdale Women's Institute for the use of their hall.

Be it also resolved that our thanks be extended to the Supervisor Miss Robin, Mrs. Laughlin, Mrs. Alton Rodd, Mrs. Lawson, the Parkdale Home Industry Exhibit, and a special thanks to Dr. L. W. Shaw as guest speaker for his most interesting and inspiring panel discussion and our most

sincere appreciation to all those who helped in any way to make this convention a success.

Miss Alton Rodd then gave an interesting detailed report of the Leadership Training Course given in Charlottetown in March and attended by the president, secretary and herself. An interesting feature and the afternoon's program was an address by Mrs. J. A. Lawson entitled, "It's on the Label." A demonstration "Island Industries" by Parkdale and an address by Miss Robin were next enjoyed by all.

It was moved by Mrs. M. F. Rodd and seconded by Mrs. Cook that the collection taken at our convention (\$14.50) be equally divided between the Jubilee Endowment Fund and the ladies who attended the L. T. C.

After a short sing-song led by Mrs. Earl Foster the meeting adjourned for delightful refreshments served buffet style.

The evening session opened at eight o'clock by the singing of O Canada. Following this a chorus by Parkdale women, Miss Hornby's String Ensemble, and the Highfield Dancers contributed pleasing numbers to the evening's program.

The speaker for the evening, Dr. L. W. Shaw, chose for his subject, "Drop-Outs from School" and a very interesting discussion followed.

The convention was brought to a close by singing "The Queen."
