OTTAWA (CP)—An efficient underground movement a few days ago set in motion to effect the defection of anti-Castro Cubans to the United States through Canada. It was learned reliably here.

A highly-qualified source said the underground movement would involve persons both in Cuba and in Canada. He does not involve anyone in Canada.

The system has been used by 14 Cubans since they fled to escape from their Communist homeland and join patriots in the U.S. They were opposed to Fidel Castro's regime.

They've made their way into the U.S. "jumping" Cuba Airlines planes landing at Newfoundland's Gander Airport. A large number of them were airplane pilots.

Sunday a 15th Cuban made a similar bid to get into the U.S. He was Ernesto Mirvora Rodriguez, M.A., copilot of a Cuban flight from Havana to Princeton who left the plane at Gander

and asked for transit privileges to go to the United States.

HAVE ASSURANCE

It is apparent the source said that the Cubans who have defected had assurance that they would be permitted to enter the U.S. through the Canadian "escape hatch."

All of the 14 Cubans who defected at Gander asked the Canadian immigration department for transit privileges. This is a procedure available to nationals of any foreign country, enabling such persons to enter Canada on a temporary basis as non-immigrants provided they are passing through Canada to another country.

The operators of the underground movement, the source said, are obviously well acquainted with this provision in the act.

There appears to be a minimum of red tape involved in the granting of visas, the source said. It was obvious that persons in the U.S. were assisting the defecting Cubans to obtain visas.

Gordon Backs Suggestion More Freedom For Railways

TORONTO (CP)—Donald Gordon, C.N.R. president, gave his support to a recommendation of the Macpherson royal commission that railways be given wider freedom to set rates.

This principle of rate freedom is in complete accord with the principles by which Canadian National has lived, within the limitations of existing regulations," he said to a joint meeting of the Canadian and American Clubs of Toronto.

He said implementation of the proposed rate freedom would permit the railways to react with speed and flexibility to the needs of competition.

"In such a truly competitive environment I am confident that the railways can and will sur-

vive as efficient, healthy and profitable undertakings," Mr. Gordon said.

of earth-shaking consequence, but the words exchanged later between East and West were unusually bitter and loud. Players sometimes do get excited if they've had a bad result on a hand, which naturally makes some people wonder why a contract player bridge, of course, such things shouldn't happen but they do.

West led the bidding with a club, raised to two clubs by West. North called and East bid three clubs. South called and East bid four clubs. South eventually got to four spades, which East doubled and North boldly redoubled.

West led a club. Declarer won in dummy and led a diamond, which East took and returned a diamond. South took the king and played a trump. Declarer held up a diamond, establishing the 10-9 as tricks on which he was able to discard two hearts. As a result, South made four spades redoubled, worth 1,000 points, having lost 100 points in the bid.

Then the fun began. West got in the first low. He claimed East should not have doubled, that (West) had shown a weak hand by passing repeatedly after having raised clubs, and that East had proved to be a "dumb and blind" in the whole matter. West's emphasis on the middle adjective.

East defended his double, pointing out that his hand contained 18 high card points, had held for any values West might have had for his raise to two clubs, and that he had every right to expect to take at least four tricks on defense.

West had not shown the intelligence he accused East of lacking, when he had passed and led a club against four spades redoubled. West should have made a constructive lead. Instead of a club, considering his club length and the bidding, and if West had a bad pointed out East, the contract would have been defeated. East-West would have been plus 400 instead of minus 1,000.
