

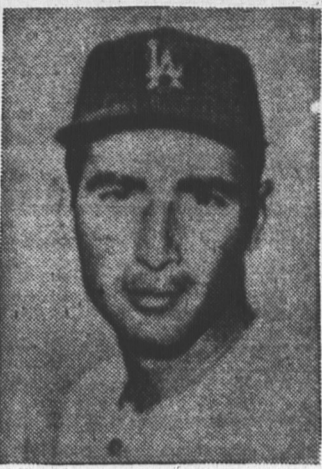
Koufax, Drysdale, Csteen Make An 8-5 Difference

 LOS ANGELES (AP) — The strong arms of Sandy Koufax, Don Drysdale and Claude Osteen make Los Angeles Dodgers the 8-to-5 favorites over the hard-hitting Baltimore Orioles in the World Series, opening Wednesday at Dodger Stadium.

Orioles manager Hank Bauer named Dave McNally, a 23-year-old left-hander with a 13-6 record, to open for the American League champions who have had almost two weeks to prepare for the big test after clinching the AL pennant Sept. 22.

"Davey has the soundest arm on the club right now," said Bauer of Baltimore before leaving for the West Coast. "If it goes seven games, we can give him three starts."

Given a similar choice of the pick of his staff, manager Walter Alton of the Dodgers would have named Koufax, his 27-game winning ace. But he was forced to pitch Sandy Sunday when Philadelphia Phillies Sunday when the Dodgers clinched the National League pennant in the last

game of the season Sunday and barely escape a playoff.

MISSED 1965 OPENER
 Koufax will be held for the second game of the best-of-seven series. If it goes seven, Koufax would have to come back for the finale with two

days rest, just as he did last year in Minnesota after missing the opener due to the Jewish holy days.

Drysdale, 13-16, was knocked out of the box by the Phillies in the first game of Sunday's doubleheader, but he undoubtedly will get the call for the first series game from Alton. Big D. had won four in a row and was working on a string of 25 scoreless innings in a fine comeback until the Phils lowered the boom.

The other possibility for the Dodgers is Claude Osteen, 17-14, a southpaw who was beaten by the Phils Friday night. He probably will work the third game.

Pitching is expected to be the hole card for the Dodgers, whose staff has a 2.63 earned run average and 32 complete games compared to the Orioles' 3.35 ERA and only 23 complete games for the entire season.

The top winner for Baltimore was Jim Palmer, 15-10. He is due to face Koufax in the second game on Thursday afternoon.

The clubs will play the first two games in Los Angeles, starting at 1 p.m. PDT (4 p.m. EDT).

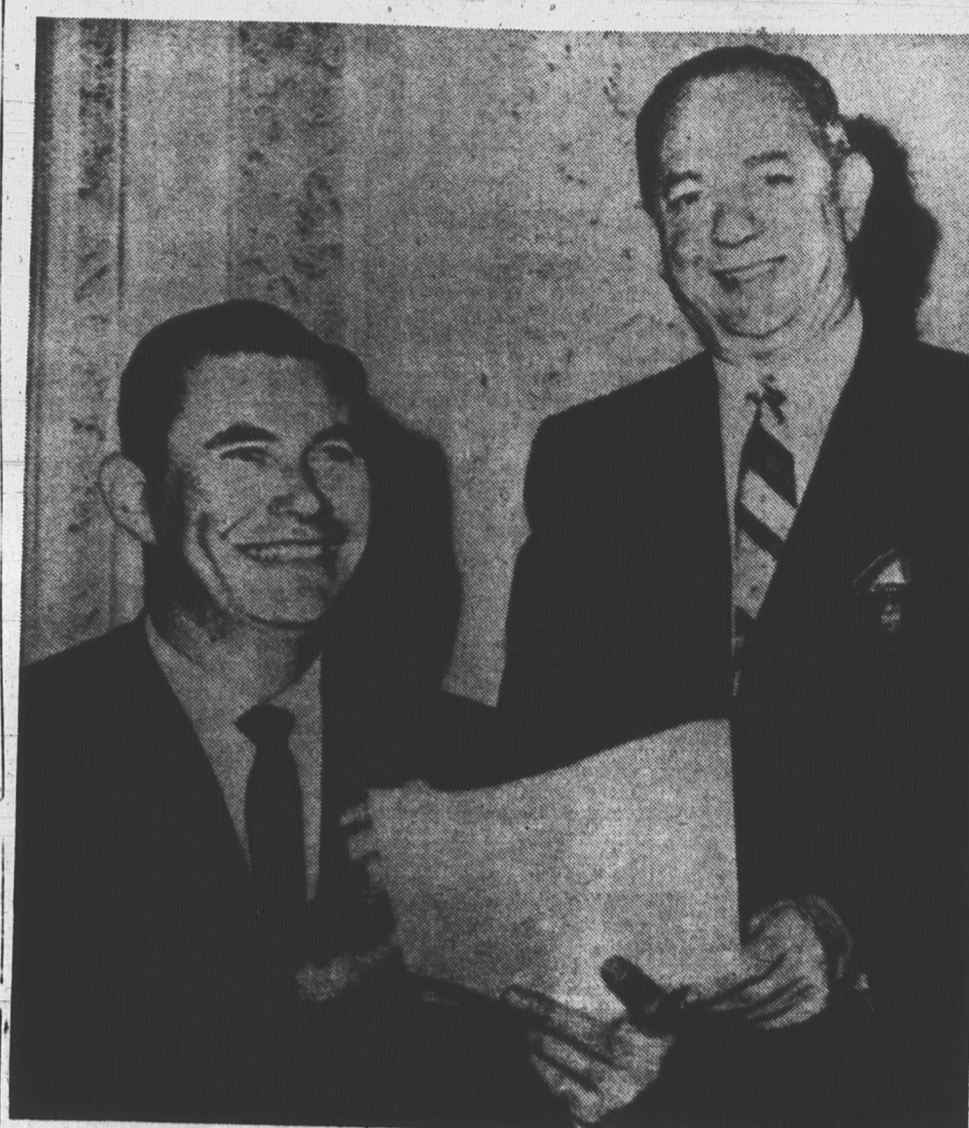
Friday will be an open date for travel and they will resume play in Baltimore Saturday, where the fourth game will be played Sunday and the fifth, if necessary, Monday.

If the issue isn't decided then, they will take another day off for travel and return to Los Angeles for a sixth, and possibly seventh game.

Baltimore has the big bomber of the year in Frank Robinson, the former Cincinnati Reds' star who won the batting triple crown with a .316 average, 49 homers and 122 runs batted in. Bauer's bullpen is his big pitching plus with men like soft-throwing Stu Miller, knuckler Eddie Fisher, young Eddie Watt and Moe Drabowsky ready to rush to the rescue.

When Alton needs to dig into his bullpen he has the veteran left-hander Ron Perranoski for the left-handed hitters and Bob Miller for the long haul in the middle innings. The stopper is Phil Regan, known as the Vulture because of his habit of coming in to pick up a decision that some other pitcher has let get away.

The Dodgers are going into their 13th World Series and their fourth since moving to Los Angeles. Alton has a 4-1 record as a Series manager, losing only in 1956.

Pacific League Steelers Thinking Of Joining CFL

VICTORIA (CP) — Although they lack fans and polish, Victoria Steelers get full marks for thinking big in a city where the tea cup probably has more followers than the Grey Cup.

The newest entry in the Pacific Football League has hopes of entering the Canadian Football League in five to 10 years, says President Ken Hole.

But as far as this year is concerned, the hopes are modest for the semi-professional team which was transplanted here from Vancouver with the help of British Columbia Lions.

Steelers would merely like to finish out of the red and out of the cellar of the six-team league. That would require at least 1,000 extra fans a game and an improvement over the opening three games which Steelers lost.

They play under American rules in a league which consists of Seattle, Tacoma and Edmonds in Washington and Eugene and Portland in Oregon.

The 20 Victoria businessmen who founded the club and pay the bills if ticket sales fall short of a \$15,000 budget have embarked on a three-year development plan.

"Eventually we'll get into the CFL," Hole says. "Either that or we'll be in a comparable American league. If Seattle goes into either the National or American football leagues, Vancouver could go too, leaving Victoria as the logical location for Vancouver's CFL franchise."

"Vancouver and Toronto will be forced to go into the U.S. league because of their drawing power and the smaller Canadian cities will make up the CFL."

"Of course, I'm thinking five to 10 years from now," Hole says. "Victoria's population area is in the same class as Regina where there is usually a sell-out for games at Taylor Field. Southern Vancouver Island has more than 200,000."

The Steelers are negotiating with the five Western Conference teams to make themselves a farm club for all.

"If they have some ball players that could make our club they can send them out here and we'll find a job for them in Victoria. We don't want to be a farm team for just one club because of the high calibre of the league we're playing in."

The American entries draw from a wealth of college talent plus AFL and NFL cuts "and many of them are good enough to be playing in the pros."

B.C. Lions gave Steelers a boost by providing equipment and coaches Pete Ohler and

Bob Boyd, both ex-Lions. Ohler is head coach and tackle and doubles as defensive coach.

Most of the players are products of the Victoria minor football system and holdovers from Vancouver Kats, the club that became the Steelers. But when Steelers were crushed 42-12 in their first game in Eugene, directors knew they had to go shopping.
