Fire Destroys General Store At Enmore

On Tuesday evening fire of unknown origin destroyed the general store and stock of Mr. Major Noye and Son at Enmore. The owners had left the building at approximately five o'clock and at that time everything appeared to be in order. At nine o'clock a nearby resident saw flames breaking through the roof of the one-story building. The alarm was spread immediately but the fire had gained too much headway to prevent complete destruction of the store and contents.

It is understood that some insurance was carried and that the estimated loss would be between four and five thousand dollars.

the meeting state that notice of failure to take out producer licenses had been sent to some large growers in the Province, and the chairman had advised that he had received a letter from Mr. Scates which was read to the meeting, and a copy of this letter was given to all board members as had been requested by Mr. Scates.

Again at an official meeting on March 3rd the minutes state that board members were advised that the case of Mr. Scates charged with shipping potatoes without a producer's license would shortly come before the court. On March 30th which is since the last hearing of the case in the court on March 25th, at a regular meeting of the board attended by all members, Mr. MacDonald had reported that the prosecution proceedings against Mr. Scates had come before the court and had been adjourned.

It had been subsequently moved, seconded and approved that this meeting of the P.M.B. approved the action taken by the chairman and manager regarding the prosecution against Mr. Scates, and they requested that further prosecutions be undertaken as soon as possible.

Mr. MacDonald in answer to a question from Mr. MacPhee stated that on or about the first of April Mr. G. E. Full had obtained a producer's license.

Mr. MacDonald was cross questioned by Mr. Scates on several points regarding licensing, sales, market conditions, and the interpretation of certain words within the government act and scheme. On many of these points objection was made by Mr. MacPhee who maintained that Mr. Scates line of questioning concerned points of law or was irrelevant to the charge.

Denies Statements

After cross examination of Mr. MacDonald had been concluded, Mr. MacPhee stated the only other witness he would call was a witness in reference to statements made at the court hearing on March 25th by Mr. G. E. Full and attributed to Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, chairman of the Provincial Marketing Board. He said Mr. Campbell had seen in the paper the report of these statements attributed to him, and had denied making this or any such statement.

Mr. J. Lincoln Dewar, of the Federation of Agriculture, who is also secretary of, and a member of the Provincial Marketing Board, stated that he had personally attended three meetings called by his board with the potato dealers of the Province.

Regarding the statement made by Mr. Full to the effect that Mr. Campbell had said there would be no prosecutions of producers for non payment of licenses this year, Mr. Dewar said he had no recollection of any such statement being made by Mr. Campbell and could see no reason why Mr. Campbell should have made any commitments in regard to producers licenses to a meeting of dealers.

He concluded his evidence by saying there definitely had been no such policy by the board.

Mr. Campbell being ill in hospital was unable to appear before the court.

In a discussion on points of law, Mr. Scates said he would like to point out some "astounding" features in the act.

He referred to the definition of marketing and transportation as defined by the act, and asked what constituted each of these terms.

He also questioned the board's authority in issuing the orders which he was charged with violating.

In reply Mr. MacPhee said that this matter had been dealt with by the Supreme Court of Canada who found the scheme good in its entirety.

He said the evidence was clear that Mr. Scates was a producer and that he had sold potatoes without a producer's license.

He noted Mr. Scates objection was not on the legal facts but rather on the authority of the board to make such an order, which, as he noted above, had been declared valid by the Supreme Court of Canada.

He said that transportation by a producer is incidental to the production, and that transportation is not a business in which the producer is engaged.

He said regardless of what an individual may think of the act and scheme they have been held valid by the Supreme Court.

evening session on the care of the child with a heart condition. These conditions may be congenital or acquired. The child who was born with a damaged heart becomes used to restrictions but the child who suddenly acquires a heart condition due to rheumatic fever or other diseases finds restrictions much more difficult.

Those who give care must understand not only the restrictive measure necessary but also the basic physical and emotional needs of the child so that he may develop physically, mentally and emotionally with as little retardation as possible from his handicap.

It is realized that apprehension of parent or nurse giving care is felt by the child; therefore one who is calm and unhurried will be most suited to give care to the
