CHINESE HATRED OF CHRISTIANS.

Trick of a Quack to Stir up a Riot Against Missionaries at Kiangyin.

SHANGHAI, July 12.—How anti-missionary riots are fomented in China is shown very clearly in the latest outrage at Kiangyin, in which only good luck saved the lives of the small party of English and Americans in that town. A Chinese quack doctor bore a grudge against the missionaries because of some fancied grievance in regard to the lease of the land for their houses. To get revenge he planned the scheme of making it appear that the missionaries bought the bodies of demerit children in order to use the hearts and eyes for medicine. He took one of his servants into his confidence, and told this man as a great secret, that the missionaries had offered him \$20 for the body of a child that had been buried the day before. He offered the man half of the proceeds to help him.

The two went to the graveyard, removed the corpse and hid it under a pile of rubbish in the yard of the missionaries. Then when the mother of the child discovered that the grave had been robbed, the quack doctor appeared and led a mob to the yard, where, after some numbers, he pretended to locate the body and had it brought before the mob. Of course the fanatical Chinese, with what looked like clear proof of the worst outrage known to the Mongolians, attacked and demolished the missionaries' houses, and the men and women connected with the mission only saved their lives by prompt flight.

After the affair was over some influential members of the mission discovered the secret of the quack's plot from the servant, who spent his money on an opium debauch. While under the influence of the drug he told of the whole shameful scheme. The quack, finding that he had been betrayed, pretended to make confession, in which he cunningly implicated the eldest son of the family that had been the investigation. Though this man was innocent, he could not endure the torture to which all Chinese suspects are subjected, and, therefore, made a false confession to save himself. Though English and American warships have been sent out to China King, where the missionaries sought shelter, it will be long before any feeling is restored. The worst feature of the case is the heavy penalty paid by the natives who befriended the missionaries.

FARMERS' AND DAIRYMEN'S ASSOCIATION.

(Conclusion of our report.) A discussion arose over the constitution with regard to who may or may not be members of the Central Association.

Mr. Shaw spoke of the branch association buying and selling cooperatively, showing the grand success of their association in that business.

A committee was appointed to wait on the late secretary with a view to getting a statement of last year's business from him.

The standing committee was continued in office and requested to prepare a constitution and bye laws for the society.

Another meeting of the association will be held in the same place on the 18th day of August.

W. W. Hubbard, on being called upon, spoke on Agriculture, with special regard to the cheapening of production and looking to the demands of the different markets for our various products. Convention adjourned.

From there it passed along Water and up Queen Street to Dorchester, destroying the buildings on both sides of Queen Street, and also destroying the buildings on Dorchester Street as far up as James Barrett's, as well as the building on the site of the Episcopal residence.

Habit in a child is at first like a spider's web; if neglected, it becomes a thread of twine, next a cord of rope, finally a cable—then, what a task to break it!

Have pupils, boys and girls: Success, fame and position are never gained but by determined and bravely sticking to a thing till it is fairly accomplished. No amount of money can be seen by others, but as you see it yourself. A lady or gentleman is not a slave to the brush and comb or the tailor shop. Good clothes are not good habits. The lady and gentleman are gentle, courteous and modest. A gentleman deems everyone better than himself. A gentleman will not allow himself to become a slave to strong drink; which, when indulged in makes a man a very beast, unfitting him to fulfil a gentleman's position in life. For the man who drinks cannot be trusted; his word cannot be taken; and his promises are not to be depended upon. Then watch yourselves, boys, when you grow older, and your shallow-brained companions try to lead you astray. THOMAS HOOD. Thomas Hood, the author of "I Remember, I Remember," and "The Song of the Shirt," was the most humorous as well as the most pathetic of the English poets. Few of the great writers of verse were the possessors of this happy combination of humor and pathos.

In the poet as well as in the man of affairs humor preserves a happy balance of the faculties, and gives to the possessor the power of resisting that pride which comes from prosperity, and that gloom which is born of misfortune.

In his poem, "I Remember, I Remember," he gives us that regret which in nature life is felt at the knowledge of the departure of the thoughts and feelings of childhood, down whose cheek will not run the tear at the remembrance of the time when the sun "Nerv' came a wink too soon, Nor brought too long a day"; when the world was redolent of truth and innocence; when all things here below were sweet and genial and delightful, and gave a glorious promise of the realization of the dreams of the youthful imagination. But the dreams and the regrets are the obedience to the great law of nature which gives to youth that warmth of feelings, born of bloom and vigor, and to age that chilliness of soul which comes from all the thoughts, the feelings and the years of childhood. These are presented by the poet with a vividness and power which the possession of the poetic faculty in the highest degree of perfection alone could enable him to give as the imprint of his noble and faultless imitation of the living, breathing figure of the human form, so the poet, by the power of words and the workings of the imagination, presents to the eye of the mind the thoughts, feelings and aspirations of men as they flow from the ever-living fountain of the human heart. Hood's poem, "I Remember, I Remember," will forever remain in the minds of the lovers of English song as the poem that more than any other is a bodiment of the sweetness of the innocence of childhood and of the bitterness of the perversity of manhood. It rouses a feeling akin to that which is aroused when a great sorrow has to be met and suffered and borne.

According to late advices from Berlin the conviction, on the charge of forgery, of Hermann Friedmann, director of the Rhenish Westphalian Bank, and his subsequent sentencing to six years of imprisonment, has thrown a dark shadow upon a big money scandal involving seventeen large Berlin banks.
