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Great Britain Seen
to Lead Natural Gas Industry

The Canadian natural gas in-
dustry today is expected to
invest more than \$2,000,000,000
in extensive new developments,
says the Canadian Gas Associa-
tion.

The comment is made in an
introduction to the association's
1962 directory of Canadian gas
utilities and it describes the ex-
pected investment as a staggering
sum for an industry which was
literally born with completion
of a west-coast pipeline in 1958.

Supplying the industry, the
association adds, creates de-
mand for many new services
and supplies and "there has
been a mushroom-like growth
of feeder and supply services."

It also states:
"Last year the industry
grossed \$227,000,000 from the
sale of natural gas in Canada,
providing an employment for
nearly 11,000 people, a 20 per-
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
