

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Aug. 13.

The Times says that Gladstone has consulted Sir Erskine May, the eminent parliamentary authority, as to the practice to be adopted under the peculiar circumstances likely to arise in connexion with the land bill conference, between the two houses, now considered unavoidable. Preparations are being made accordingly.

LONDON, Aug. 14.

The Observer understands that yesterday a Cabinet Council decided, practically, to insist on the land bill as it was finally passed by the Commons, and in the event of the Lords remaining obdurate, Parliament will be summoned again in November when the bill will be re-introduced; but there is a disposition to then force in the House of Lords a bill more distasteful than the present one.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.

The World's London despatch says that the step that the House of Lords has taken in throwing out the most sweeping clauses of the Land Bill has not only created great excitement in the political world, but has stirred the country from end to end. Men see that a battle between Democracy and Plutocracy is at hand, and there is an uncomfortable feeling abroad that grave political and perhaps constitutional changes are imminent.

Gladstone, who had a long interview last night with Granville and Carlingford, his lieutenants in the House of Lords, gave them liberty to say he will not yield a hair's breadth in this struggle, and that he will seize the opportunity of calling the attention of the country to the fact that the work of an entire session of a vast majority of the people's representatives can be destroyed in a few hours by the upper house. Should a conference between the two houses fail, Gladstone will call an autumn session, introducing a still stronger and more sweeping bill and bid the Lords reject it at their peril. Some of his friends to-day go so far as to say that no arrangement can be reached next week, the Premier will at once dissolve Parliament and appeal to the country.

LONDON, Aug. 13.

In the House of Commons, last night, Ritchie (Conservative) moved an address to the Queen, praying the Queen to withhold consent from any commercial treaty with France which shall substitute specific for ad valorem duties in any way injurious to British manufactures, and which shall bind England for more than one year. This is a reconnaissance of the Conservative Protectionists, intended as a prelude to demonstrations in the Provinces during the recess of Parliament. Ritchie pointed out that free trade had made no progress abroad, and that at home there was a growing feeling that much of the present depression in trade was owing to our commercial policy. Though he held that protection was of no avail for our manufactures, he insisted that steps ought to be taken to save them from exclusion from foreign markets. Sir Charles Dilke opposed the motion, but repeated that the Government would not be parties to any treaty prejudicial to British trade. He quoted statistics to show that the trade of the country was increasing, and in regard to the policy of retaliation he pointed out that a large portion of our imports from France were articles of food, and that whatever might be the case abroad, the country could not tolerate an imposition of duties on food. After some discussion Ritchie's motion was negatived, 150 to eighty.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

LONDON, Aug. 15.

The "Standard" says it is stated upon good authority that the Viceroy of India has telegraphed for permission to supply the Ameer with more money, in the hope that it will enable him to make good his position. The Government has arranged for a return, during three weeks, of half the troops sent to the Transvaal.

LONDON, Aug. 13.

The "Times" Tunis despatch says the whole country from Tunis to Kroumir mountains may be said to be in insurrection. The town of Susa is quiet but the district comprising fifty villages and their inhabitants are menacing the town.

VIENNA, Aug. 14.

Immense frauds have been discovered at Adrianople in the administration of indirect Turkish taxes. One official has defrauded the Government of stamps valued at 17,500 Turkish pounds.

UNITED STATES.

PORTLAND, Me., Aug. 13.

Charles Boynton, river driver and mill hand, aged 32, has lately arrived in Saco with his wife. Two days ago she went to her mother's house at Barnville. He followed, and this morning, going to her room, demanded if she would ever live with him again. She replied "No." He threatened to kill her. She then sprang from the second story window to the ground unhurt. Her sister (Mrs. Waterhouse) entered the room and was twice fired at by him, one ball passing through the palm of her hand and the other entering her breast. He then shot himself through the pit of the stomach and expired instantly. Mrs. Waterhouse will probably die.

UNIONTOWN, Pa., Aug. 13.

Intense excitement was created here yesterday over the arrest of eight men supposed to be the murderers of Maurice Healey, Superintendent of the Dunbar Furnace Co., and members of the order of Mollie Maguires. The men were taken out of the mines while at work and placed in jail at that point; but fears are entertained, owing to the weak condition of the jail, that the prisoners may succeed in escaping.

RUSSIA has refused a request of the English Government to send a delegate to the Commission which is to undertake the delimitation of the Transcaspien frontier. In his letter to the English Minister, the Russian Minister of Foreign Affairs reasons that England has no right to interfere in those matters or to be represented in a commission. The only parties concerned in the settlement of the boundary line, he says, are Russia, Persia and Merv, and they can adjust it without England's aid, arbitration, dictation or interference.

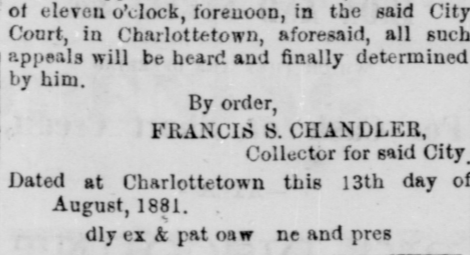
