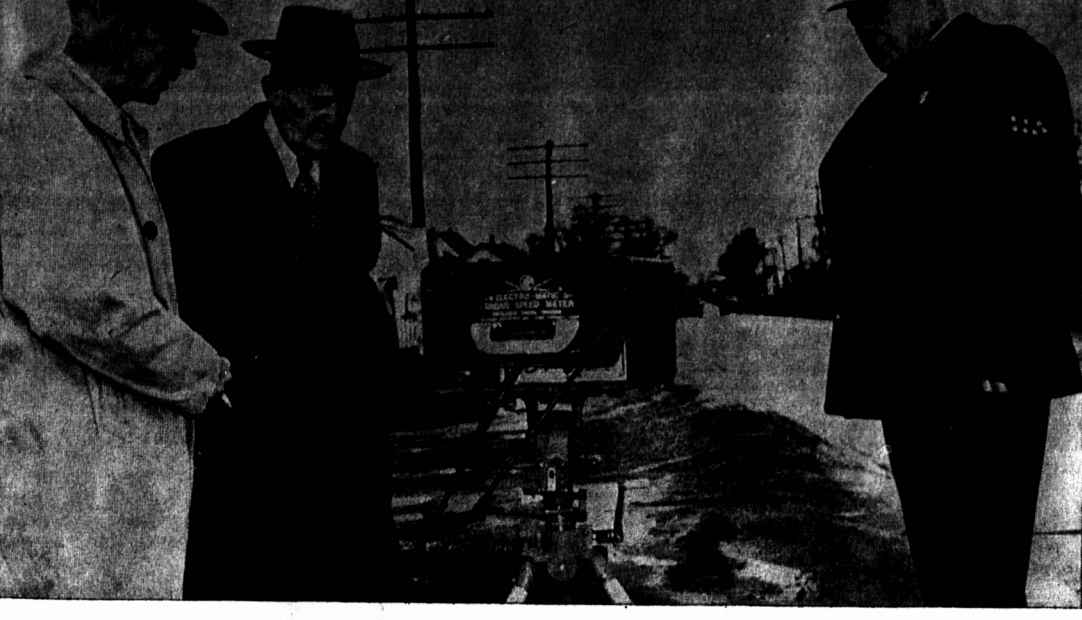

He said that as far as he knew the first mention of the poppy was away back in Chinese history when the poppy was considered not a symbol of remembrance but one of forgetfulness mainly because the product of its seeds which produced forgetfulness rather than remembrance optimum.
During the Napoleonic wars in France it began to be considered as a flower of remembrance due to the great profusion of poppies which sprung in such numbers from the new graves of the fellow soldiers. In 1921 it was introduced to a meeting of Great War veterans in Fort William, Ont. by a lady from France who, along with her family, had stood great losses in the 1914-1918 war. At that time it was officially adopted by Canada as its official emblem of remembrance. He also stressed that the funds from the Poppy Campaign were spent in their entirety in relief to needy veterans.
