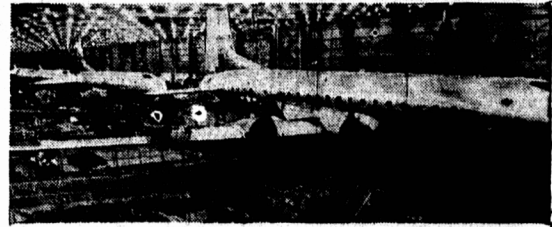
Presbyterian W. M. S.

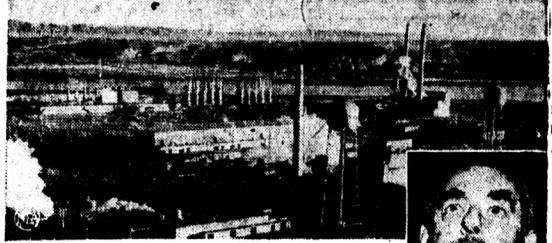

ACHESON'S THREE-POINT PEACE PLAN

Depicted above are the three basic points of the peace-disarmament plan proposed by Secretary of State Dean Acheson (inset). Russia is likely to reject the plan because it insists on U. N. inspections of A-bomb plants and stockpiles, a clause designed to safeguard the Western powers from treacherous violations of armament limitations. A Kremlin veto, however, would represent another propaganda victory for the U. S. and its Allies.
