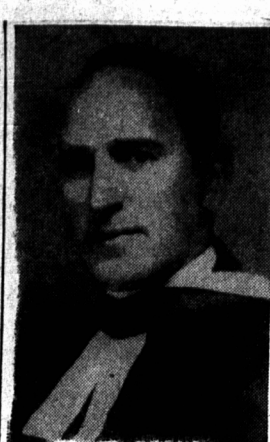

NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market moved across a slim gain on average Tuesday despite late profit-taking which trimmed sizeable early advances. Steels were favored most of the day. Rails, although somewhat higher, failed to repeat their stellar role of Monday. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks nudged ahead 40 cents to \$188.601.

U.S. Steel was the day's most active stock, up 1/4 at 61 1/2 on 36,300 shares.

Among the leading rails, Atlantic Coast Line with a three-point gain was about the only one to retain the bulk of its earlier advance. Canadian issues were led by Granby Mining with a gain of 1 1/4. Hudson Bay Mining, International Nickel and McIntyre Porcupine were up 1/4, while Distillers-Sea-grams was down 1/4. On the American stock exchange Shawinigan was up 1/4, Brazilian Traction 1/4.
