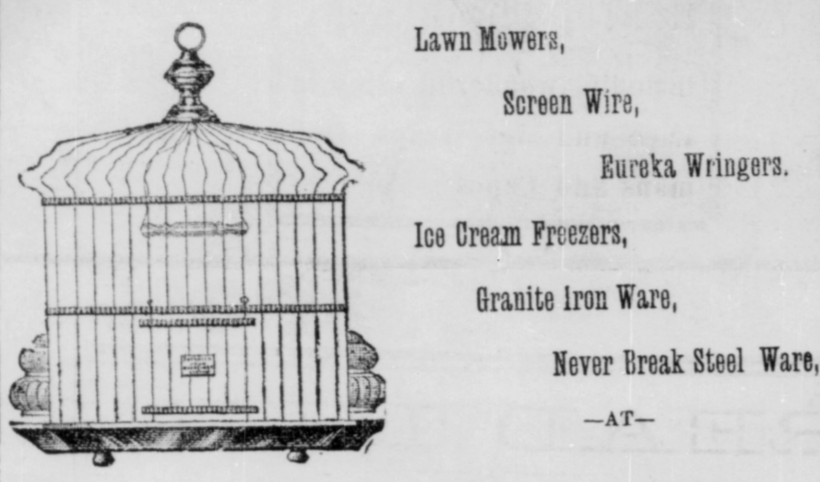

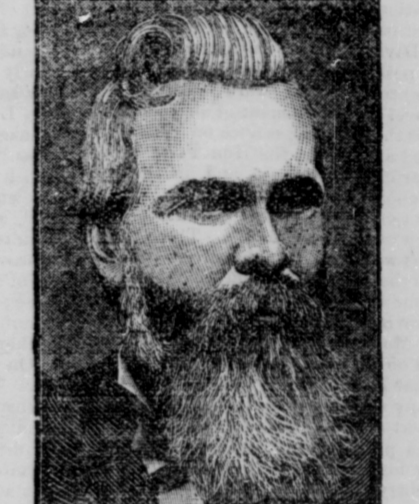

Address and Presentation.
One of the largest congregations ever witnessed at St. Margaret's assembled at the church on the feast of St. Peter and Paul to hear the farewell sermon of their revered pastor. After High Mass the priest returned to the sanctuary, when one of the parishioners advanced to the rail and read the following address, which was accompanied by a well filled purse:—
ADDRESS.
TO REV. J. C. McLEAN, P. P., St. Margaret's.
REV. AND DEAR SIR,—It is with the most profound sorrow that we, the parishioners of St. Margaret's, learn that your connection with this parish is about to be severed. The news, so sudden and unexpected, we were quite unprepared for, as we looked forward to a long and pleasant intimacy.
For the nearly two years you have been our parish priest you have won for yourself our unbounded love and esteem. From the first you have taken a lively interest in our welfare, both spiritual and temporal, and it is particularly gratifying to know that your labors have been crowned with success. We are proud to say that, as a result of your exertions in the temperance cause, not a drop of liquor is now sold in the parish, and your parishioners have become a practically temperance people. It also gives us pleasure to add that by your wise management the finances of the parish are in a most flourishing condition.
And now that you are about to leave us and the inevitable moment of parting has come, we cannot withhold our grief. For we feel that an affectionate friend and a loving spiritual father is about to be taken from us. As for ourselves, though we shall no longer acknowledge your fatherly care, we shall always bear in our hearts the sentiments of the most lively gratitude for the countenance and favors you have bestowed on our behalf.
Please accept the accompanying purse as a slight token of our regard; and while we wish you Godspeed in your new field of labor, we earnestly entreat you to daily remember us in your prayers, as we shall do for you in ours.
The reverend pastor made a feeling reply.

He said that the kind words conveyed in the address just read and the substantial purse presented him, was but further tangible evidence of the kindness and good will shown him on every occasion since he became their pastor. He could truly say that the two years spent in the parish of St. Margaret's was the happiest of his life. He would always retain pleasant memories of the people, and wherever he should be, when offering up the Sacrifice of the Mass, he would not forget the people of this parish. He counselled the people to remain faithful, and if the lessons he endeavored to instill in their hearts would remain fruitful he would be grateful. World's Columbian Exposition,
Chicago, 1893.

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has accepted the invitation of the Government of the United States to take part in the World's Columbian Exposition, to be held in Chicago from 1st May to 31st October, 1893. As it is important that a very full display of Canadian products be made on this occasion, a general invitation is extended to Canadian producers and manufacturers in agriculture, horticulture, or in the arts of forestry, fisheries, minerals, machinery, manufactures, etc., etc., to assist in bringing together such a display of the natural resources and industrial products of Canada as will be a credit to the country.
An Executive Commissioner for Canada has been appointed, who will have the general charge of the exhibits and the allotment of space, and the several Provincial Governments have been invited to cooperate with the view of making the exhibition as complete and satisfactory as possible.
The Dominion Government will pay the transport of exhibits going and returning, and for the placing of articles on the exhibition.
Entries must be made not later than 31st July. The reception of articles at the Exhibition buildings will commence 1st November, 1892, and all exhibits, excepting Live Stock, must be in place by 1st April, 1893.
