Shaw Festival Closes Tonight

Producer-director Lionel Dixon said yesterday that he was feeling a bit "nostalgic" now that the Shaw Festival is coming to an end with the production of "Salad Days" tonight. He emphasized that the festival would continue again next year as many of the same cast as possible. Final decisions on the plays to be presented at that time have not been made as yet, but Mr. Dixon said that "Androcles and the Lion" by George Bernard Shaw was one choice that was quite definite. The festival still has received no word on whether or not they will be able to use the theatre in the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building for their 1964 program. This will be among the topics discussed at the annual meeting of the festival organizers next month. Plans are already being made for next winter. The local members of the festival cast hope to form the nucleus of a "theatre club" which will present a number of plays throughout the winter. These will be available to the public by subscription. RESULTS ENCOURAGING Mr. Dixon felt that the 1963 Shaw Festival was very successful. Total attendance so far, he said, has been 3,430, which averages out at about 100 spectators per performance. The festival audiences varied a great deal in size with the attendance, and peak attendance evenings. Attendance has been highest this week, he said. Over 200 were present for Wednesday's production of the musical comedy, "Salad Days," while about 200 attended "candida" last evening. It still remains to be seen whether or not the festival has paid for itself, as figures cannot be tallied until the season is completed.

Fasting Freedomite Dies Of Starvation

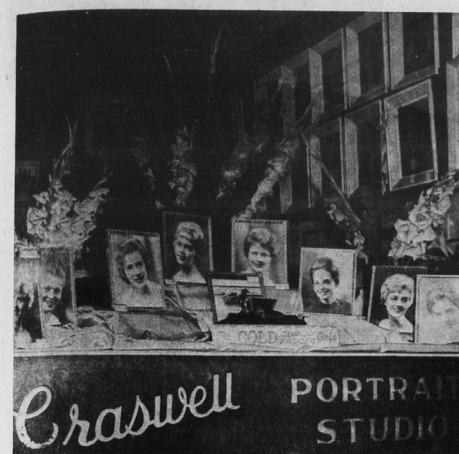

Headless Valley Clue Is Found

VANCOUVER (CP) — A gold ring is believed to have given RCMP their first clue in identifying a body found Aug. 6 in the fabled Headless Valley of the Fraser. The body has been tentatively identified as that of Martin (Marty) Smith, 21, a Swiss farmer who went into the valley June 25 with Fritz Weismann, 26, a Swiss blacksmith, and Wolfgang Malmke, 25, an East German mechanic. No trace has been found of the other two. At least 10 persons have died in Headless Valley, which recedes into the distance after the decapitated body of a prospector was found there near the start of the valley.

VATICAN CITY (Reuters) — The Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano says roots of the South Vietnamese government's resistance to communism, is not a religious struggle, L'Osservatore Romano says, even though Diem is a Roman Catholic.
