More Earthquake Shocks.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Nov. 5. A serious earthquake shock was felt in this city this afternoon. The vibrations continued forty seconds, buildings were violently shaken and people rushed out into the streets.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 5. There was the severest shock yet felt at Sumter to-day and a severe and continued shock at Greenwood, S. C. Perhaps the severest yet felt. No one was seriously hurt.

Testimonial to Gladstone.

LONDON, Nov. 5. Gladstone has made the following reply to a letter from a prominent Liberal who proposed the presentation to him of a national testimonial: "I do not desire and should regret the presentation of any national testimonial, even if the desire sprang from a feeling widely spread, which feeling I do not think exists."

Reform Among the Hackmen.

MONTREAL, Nov. 5. The hackmen's union have issued a circular agreeing to abstain from labor on Sunday's in future, and requesting all hackmen not to bring out their teams for hire on Sunday's, because "God commanded man to keep the Sabbath day holy; and because our horses require rest from labor as well as we do ourselves."

The Southampton Fire.

SOUTHAMPTON, OHL., Nov. 5. Nearly forty families were rendered homeless and destitute by yesterday's fire. The near approach of winter renders the situation still more alarming, and well calculated to appeal to the charitable people. It is feared that the losses figure up to over \$50,000. The insurance is merely a trifle, about \$10,000.

Russian Rule Proclaimed.

TIERNOVA, Nov. 5. The Russian Captain Nalokoff, who was leader of the coup d'etat last May, at midnight on Wednesday led a band of Montenegro's, which attacked the Prefecture at Bourgas, seized the Prefect and other officials and proclaimed Russian rule. The Government has sent troops to quell the revolt.

Labor Candidates.

TORONTO, Nov. 5. The trade and labor council to-night appointed a candidate to meet a committee from the district assembly of the Knights of Labor to discuss the advisability of running labor candidates at the approaching Dominion and Provincial elections.

Accusing Gladstone.

LONDON, Nov. 5. Lord Bradbourne, writing to the editor of Blackwood's Magazine, accuses Gladstone of serious misstatements and perversions of Irish history without courage to defend or candor to withdraw them.

A Heavy Storm.

LONDON, Nov. 5. A remarkable storm cloud has burst over the Lake Region of England. The storm was the heaviest ever known in that locality. The damage to property was very large.

Breach of Promise Case.

MONTREAL, Nov. 5. Miss Weatherby, of Quebec, has entered an action for \$15,000 damages against J. B. Lamontagne, advocate of this city, for alleged breach of promise of marriage.

A Destructive Fire.

DRESDEN, OHL., Nov. 5. A destructive fire occurred here early this morning, destroying a whole block on either side of the street. Loss about \$25,000; insurance, \$10,000.

In Financial Difficulties.

MONTREAL, Nov. 5. George Barry, hide and leather merchant, is in financial difficulties. His liabilities are placed at about \$100,000.

Procession Prohibited.

LONDON, Nov. 5. The proposed Socialistic meeting in Trafalgar Square on Lord Mayor's day has been prohibited.

Best Recipe for Curing Meat.

Those who will carefully adopt our method of curing pork and beef will be enabled to enjoy as fine hams, tongues, dried beef and rounds as the Emperor of all the Russias can command, always providing that the meat cured is of the best quality. It is this: To 1 gallon of water take 1/2 lbs of salt, half lb of sugar, half ounce of saltpetre, half ounce of pearlash—in this ratio, the pickle is to be increased to any quantity desired. Let these be boiled together until all the dirt from the sugar (which will not be a little) rises to the top, and is skimmed off. Then throw it into a tub to cool, and when cold pour it over your beef or pork to remain the usual time, say four or five weeks. The meat must be well covered with pickle and should not be put down for at least two days after killing, during which time it should be slightly sprinkled with powdered saltpetre. Several of our friends have omitted the boiling of the pickle, and found it to answer equally well. By boiling the pickle, it is purified, for the amount of dirt which is thrown off by the operation, from the salt and sugar, would surprise anyone not acquainted with the fact.

The Moncton Times reports that Mr. Joseph Martin, of St. Croix, Hants, N. S., has made from two cows, 600 lbs., of butter in six months, which will be sold on an average of 24 cents per lb., making \$144. Mr. Martin has an order for 60 lbs. of butter to be sent to England, a guarantee of its excellent quality.
